Concerning the location in Lincoln of the new Odd Fellows Home, W. D. Crawford says:

"Several magnificent sites have been offered at very reasonable prices and the local committee has been busy in selecting the advantages of each place and getting ready for the special committee of 'Home Trustees,' who will soon be here to look them over, and determine whether this home should be located here or elsewhere.

"If this home is located here, or near Lincoln, it will be sure to make this the permanent location of the annual meetings of the largest fraternal order in the world; the present membership numbers 1,242,788 in good standing, and more than 1,000,000 of them reside in Nebraska. The next grand lodge will be held here beginning on the third Tuesday in October; these meetings bring to the city annually from 500 to 1,200 persons.
