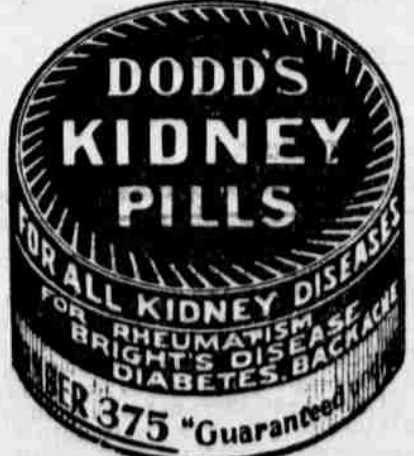

SEEN and HEARD in NEW YORK

Crowds Go to Natural History Museum



NEW YORK.—The Museum of Natural History was open free to the public every day of the year of 1908 and on 179 evenings. The gross attendance last year was 1,043,562, in large part due to the exceptional interest in the international tuberculosis exhibition. The attendance at public afternoon and evening lectures reached a total of 82,718.

The number of children visiting the museum in lecture classes was 10,325. The number of children who were especially guided through the tuberculosis exhibition and who listened to lectures on simple means of prevention of this disease was 41,627. These children came from all the high schools of Greater New York and from many distant towns and cities. In the schools of the city 575,801 children were reached by the circulating nature study collections.

During the coming year the principal new exhibitions which will be developed are in particular the Children's museum, the Museum for the Blind, the Philippine exhibition and the Congo exhibition presented by King Leopold of Belgium. The last is the most complete collection outside of that which is to be seen in the Congo museum near Brussels. As a result of the tuberculosis exhibition immediate steps will be taken to make a special exhibition of the life and habits of the smaller organisms in relation to health and disease.

During the year 1908 and at the present time the museum's explorations extend to the Mackenzie river and the shores of Beaufort sea, to Alaska, Vancouver, Alberta and Saskatchewan, the west coast of Hudson bay and western Labrador; in the United States parties have been spread in Wyoming, Montana, Idaho, North Dakota, Nebraska, Colorado and Florida, also in Central America and in the south of Nicaragua, the West Indies and Bahama islands; in Asia special agents are working in Kashmir, China and Korea; among the islands of the Pacific the museum is working in the Philippines, the Solomon islands, Tahiti, New Zealand, the South Shetland islands and Kerguelen island.

Olga Roosevelt a Youthful Heiress



THROUGH successive inheritances Miss Olga Roosevelt, only daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Robert B. Roosevelt of 116 East Fifty-fifth street, becomes one of the youthful heiresses of the town. Although only 17 years old, Miss Roosevelt is nearly a millionaire in her own right, not to count possible future inheritances.

Through the will of her maternal grandmother, the late Mrs. Stephen S. Cummins, the young woman received an additional \$200,000, the income to be hers now and the principal when she becomes of age.

The numerous marriages of the Roosevelt and Woodhouse families make an intricate genealogy. Robert B. Roosevelt, the elder, who died a few years ago after a most active life in New York public affairs, was twice married. Likewise his youngest son, the present Robert B. Roosevelt.

The first wife of the latter Mr. Roosevelt was Grace Woodhouse, only child of the late Lorenzo G. Wood-

house. Mrs. Woodhouse married Mr. Cummins for her second husband, who survives her.

It was from the Woodhouse estate that Miss Olga Roosevelt has received her largest bequests. In the will of her grandfather was a legacy of \$250,000. Her mother left an estate which has increased considerably in value and is now estimated at more than a quarter of a million dollars.

Mr. Roosevelt applied to the courts several years ago to determine the amount of annual income to be paid his daughter out of the estate, and \$10,000 a year was decreed.

The income from this latest bequest of the grandmother, Mrs. Cummins, adds another \$10,000 a year in income. It is estimated that the three bequests, all held in trust for the young woman until she becomes 21, are yielding her at least \$30,000 a year. When the principal is turned over to her it will probably amount to \$1,000,000.

All this sum comes through her mother's family. The Roosevelt family is very well-to-do, and as an only child additional inheritances doubtless will be hers. Mr. Roosevelt is a cousin of the ex-president. He married Miss Hamersly half a dozen years ago for his second wife. They have no children.

Servant Bounty Plan Fails in Practice



WHEN the magazines were publishing learned theoretical dissertations on how to make home happy and keep a servant, some ten years or more ago, the German women of New York city began to work out the theories in actual practice. Some five hundred of them joined in the German Housewives' association located in East Fifty-ninth street, New York city.

The Housewives' club undertook to adapt the European customs of service to American needs, and took up regular quarters to work out their theories. From the beginning they tried the German system of premiums for length of service. Twenty dollars' bounty was offered any maid at the end of two years' consecutive

service. The club opened an employment agency, where applicants might register free of charge and get a chance in the household of some club member.

That was ten years ago, and now the secretary is quite willing to acknowledge that the German system will not "go" in this country. Premiums have been paid regularly, and although one faithful soul receives the amount now multiplied by five, and some few others have three or four years to their credit, still it cannot be said that the 500 housewives who are members have been supplied with uninterrupted service.

The secretary believes that there is something in the air here that soon renders the recent immigrant from Germany "fractious and bumptious, and so independent." Here the secretary wrung her hands. They also gave the girls a "kaffeklatsch" at times. But to no effect.

Now the German housewives are looking for a new scheme to secure domestic peace and quiet for the club members.

Woman in Charge of Wireless Station



ANNA A. NEVINS, 22 years old, has taken active charge of the station of the United Wireless Telegraph Company on the roof of the Waldorf-Astoria hotel. She holds the distinction of being the only woman wireless operator in the world, and she is believed to be one of the most skillful in the service of the company by which she is employed.

The young woman will be on duty regularly every day for eight hours. She has been detailed to the busiest period of the day, and at present her chief work will be to keep in touch with vessels plying between this port and southern points. Many wireless messages are sent out by passengers on these vessels, the majority of whom are bound south for the Florida season or else to Cuba or other parts of the West Indies.

Miss Nevins, it was told, flashes messages through the air to her sweetheart, who is the wireless operator aboard the steamship Oceana of the Hamburg-American line. She has picked up the Oceana at 1,000 miles, the record for the Waldorf-Astoria sending station. She has several times flashed messages to her sweetheart at that distance and has carried on a lengthy aerial conversation with him at a distance of 800 miles. This is believed to be the record in long-distance talks in which Cupid has had a hand.

The young woman operator wears the uniform cap and coat of the service. She has altered the lines of the coat, giving it a feminine cut while preserving its strictly service appearance. The cap also has been slightly altered, giving it a smarter look, and it also differs from the regular cap of the company in that it is held in place by a hatpin. Miss Nevins is an expert in wireless instruments, and was selected for the post partly by reason of her practical knowledge of the system she operates.
