\$1,000 for an Ear of Corn.

To the farmer exhibiting the best ear of corn. W. K. Kellogg, the breakfast food manufacturer, offers a \$1,000 gold and silver trophy cup, which is one of Tiffany's masterpieces—to win it means an honor to the grower, his state and county. Men who win such prizes become known in every grain market; every factory where cereals are used as raw material; in the state and United States Department of Agriculture, as well as in foreign lands. This sounds like a broad statement but L. B. Gore who won the Indiana corn trophy last year was offered a position for three years by the Russian government, before he had been home with his trophy three months.

Mr. Kellogg is making food of corn and his factories consume thousands of bushels daily. Of course he wants the best corn he can buy and one way he has of learning where to buy corn, is by offering a trophy. The farmer who wins attracts attention to his community as one in which good corn is produced. The corn to compete for the trophy may be entered in any of the classes at the National Corn Exposition. The judges at the show in Omaha will decide and the grower in Omaha will receive the trophy. The best single ear gets the trophy.

Fall Plowing

Plowing is a matter that is receiving attention throughout the state. The probable increase in this matter is to be found in the fact that farmers are turning out their teams to plow so arranged that time is being put to the most use and the best of their work. Of course, plowing is a matter that is most important to the farmer. The ordinary farmer gets his labor for plowing by "choking work" with his neighbors. The equipment for chock plowing is much larger, requires more men and more teams than for stack plowing. The labor that the farmer receives from his neighbors he must pay back in kind and at the time his neighbors demand it. This takes time when it is most imperatively demanded at home. By the time that plowing is over, a fall must generally be cut, and wild hay made. Then comes potato harvest and then corn harvest. Necessary work keeps pushing all the time, so that fall plowing seems to be out of the question. The remedy for state of affairs lies in a change in farm management. Chock plowing should speedily become a thing of the past. It is too wasteful and too expensive to be longer tolerated. It demands a maximum of labor at a time when it is most needed on the home farm. Grain may be stacked and threshed with far less labor and more of it saved for the grain bin than by the method now in vogue. A light covering with slough hay, or timothy or wild hay will protect the stack from the weather if they are properly built. The plowing may then be postponed till after the fall plowing is done and labor may easily be had. As an inducement to farmers to make the change in management above suggested and as encouragement to them to undertake a work that is too much neglected on nearly every farm, we shall here set forth some of the benefits to be derived by plowing in the fall, and by plowing as deeply as possible with the ordinary farm equipment. In the first place it will add to the fertility of the soil. All soil contain mineral salts that are or may become the bases from which plant food may be made. These mineral salts in the form in which they originally exist in the soil are not immediately available for plant food. They must first be oxidized. To illustrate, potassium is not a plant food, but potash an oxidized product of potassium is a plant food. Exposure to the action of the oxygen of the air and to the effect of the various atmospheric influences oxidizes these mineral salts and converts them into plant food, thus adding to the fertility of the soil. On old worn soils the effect of deep plowing is readily to be seen in the first crop. On these the mineral salts contained in the ordinary furrow slice obtained in shallow plowing have nearly all been oxidized and made available and used up, so that the soil seems to be exhausted. But drop the plow deeper, turn out to the action of the elements soil that has never been before disturbed, and new plant food is made available, equivalent to the application of so much chemical fertilizer. It is better and cheaper to dig up the fertilizer with a plow than to buy it at enhanced prices in the general market. (Continued next week)
