Mr. Trine on behalf of Mr. Leonard asks city to take action in opening street south of Mr. Leonard's tract. Mayor appointed Bailey and Oatman to look up the matter and report at next council meeting.  
R. D. Moritz et al appeared in behalf of petitioners and asks Council to take action in opening streets appraised by the committee selected.  
Petitions and report of appraisers on the Overman tracts presented and read. Moved by Bailey and seconded by Oatman that the report of appraisers on the Overman be laid over until the next regular meeting. No McArthur, Pulsipher, yes Bailey and Oatman. Mayor voted yes and declared carried.  
Petition and report of appraisers on the Taber et al tract presented and read. Moved by Bailey seconded by Oatman that report of appraisers on Taber et al tract be laid over until next meeting. No McArthur, Pulsipher, yes Bailey and Oatman. Mayor voted yes and declared carried.  
Clerk read communication from L. H. Blackledge in regard to Ohmstead vs city, case pending in Supreme Court. Mayor stated he had arranged with Mr. Blackledge to attend to this case. Moved by McArthur seconded by Pulsipher that Mr. Blackledge present his expense account. Yes McArthur, Pulsipher, Bailey and Oatman. Carried.  
Petition of voters on license or no license read. Moved by McArthur and seconded by Bailey that the request be granted and clerk instructed to place the question on ballot. Yeas McArthur, Bailey, Oatman, no Pulsipher.  
Moved by McArthur seconded by Bailey that Mayor appoint a committee of three to buy a new desk not to exceed \$45 for the use of Light and Water Commissioner. Yes McArthur, Pulsipher, Bailey. Carried. Mayor appointed McArthur, Bailey and Burgess committee.  
Clerk stated that Frank Peterson and Geo. Morhart had been notified to file bonds for plumbing and electric light wiring license. Moved by Bailey and seconded by Pulsipher that if bond is not furnished by next regular meeting the clerk is instructed to cancel license. Yeas McArthur, Pulsipher and Bailey. Carried.  
W. K. Geer appeared and asked Council to pass on a new "Bible" which he presented. No action taken.  
Report of G. W. Burgess Water and Light Commissioner, read and filed.  
Report of J. O. Butler city treasurer read and filed.  
Motion to adjourn.
