### S. M. Milligan Found Dead

Saturday while two boys, Simon Huffer and Vernon Munsell were hunting down by the river they found the body of Silas M. Milligan lying in the channel of the river. Coroner Amack was informed and he at once took charge. The old gentleman had undoubtedly attempted to cross but slipped and fell and was unable to get out and was drowned. The deceased was born in Warren Co., Kentucky April 8, 1840. He enlisted in the 17th Kentucky volunteer cavalry and was honorably discharged at the close of the war. He is an old resident of this city coming here in 1876. One son, Charles, of McCook survives him. Interment was made in the local cemetery.
