**D. B. Spanogle**

The news of the death of D. B. Spanogle at his home on Fourth avenue last Monday afternoon was a great shock to the people of this city. A short time ago he was stricken with Exhaustion Heart Failure and tho he made a gallant fight for life he could not overcome the ironies of the disease and passed quietly away into the great beyond.

Mr. Spanogle was born in Pennsylvania July 14, 1834 and cast his lot with Webster County, Nebraska early in the seventies.

He took an active part in civic affairs and in 1892 was elected mayor of this city. This office he filled with credit. His administration was one of the best in the history of the city.

He early engaged in the real estate business and has sold large amounts of Nebraska and Kansas land. His efforts contributed largely in the development of this country. Having influential acquaintance back in the east he interested them in the new country and induced them to invest their surplus here to the great benefit of this community.

As a man, Mr. Spanogle was kind and considerate. He was ever mild and agreeable yet firm and unyielding when it came to matters which involved his conviction. He was an active member of the Methodist church for many years.

In the death of D. B. Spanogle this community loses an energetic public spirited citizen.

The Chief along with a large number of friends offer condolences to the bereaved children.

Funeral services were held from the home and interment was made in our city cemetery beside the body of his wife who departed this life about eight years ago.

Deceased leaves three children, Miss Belle Spanogle of this city, Horace and Katie of Denver, Colo.

J. W. Robertson of Red Cloud, Neb., one of the well-to-do farmers and stockmen of Webster county, thinks the wheat in that community will not make any more than a half crop this season. A good deal of the land has already been plowed up and prepared for corn. he says: "We still have a few cattle in the feed lots," said Mr. Robertson, "but they are being marketed now pretty fast. That is one of the great feeding districts of the state. We never go back entirely on cattle seeding, and fed out a good many this spring. But farmers have been more interested in hogs than anything else. Farmers have simply been selling hogs, and paying no attention to raising them, until we are about out of them. Just as long as hog prices hold up to this high point, no attempt will be made to breed up and increase the hog supply, but should the price go down then we would probably be better enabled to give them attention and increase the stock. Farmers have been making big money on hogs, to be sure, in spite of the high priced corn. We are looking after the spring pig crop with considerable interest, however and with a smaller number of brood sows we will give them special attention. In the meantime the selling goes on, and whenever a shont reaches 150 lbs. in weight, it is on the market. Formerly we held back that sized hogs and made them heavy before marketing them. By hustling them off at this light weight the real pork product is not as large as it would be of course were the same number of heavy hogs marketed. The alfalfa is looking well, and in a few days we expect to begin planting corn. The only trouble is that the surface of the ground is very dry, and needs a good rain to put it in shape."—Kansas City Drovers' Telegram.
