3rd. The general nature of the business to be transacted by this corporation shall be the constructing, building, owning, leasing, etc. and selling, etc. of Telephone and telegraph lines, acquiring and selling rights in central exchanges, etc. and all such other functions as are necessary for carrying on the business of the transmission of news and messages local and long distance for its members and the public in general. To acquire and dispose of property, real and personal as may be necessary for the transaction of the said business.

4th. The authorized capital stock of this corporation shall be \$3000.00 divided into shares of \$30.00 each to be issued one share to each of the signers of this incorporation agreement. In consideration of their surrendering to said corporation all their right, title and interest in the co-partnership now known as the Amboy Telephone Company and one share to each of the other members of said co-partnership. The Amboy Telephone Company in consideration of their transferring to said corporation all their right and title in said co-partnership. The remaining shares to be treasury stock to be disposed of as the board of directors may designate for the benefit of said corporation.

5th. The time of the commencement of this corporation shall be April 5th, 1910 and it shall continue for the period of 99 years.  
6th. The highest amount of indebtedness or liability to which this corporation shall at any time subject itself shall not exceed 20 percent per value of the paid up stock, issued and outstanding.  
7th. The business of this corporation shall be conducted by a board of directors not to exceed five in number who shall be elected annually from and by the stockholders. A president, vice-president, secretary and treasurer to be selected from and by the said board of directors.

### Ordinance No 77.

An ordinance permitting and regulating the occupation of certain streets in the City of Red Cloud for Street Railway purposes, and to amend Ordinance No. 62 entitled: "An ordinance regulating street railways within the City of Red Cloud, and providing for the keeping of the tracks of all such railways on a level with the street surface, and providing penalties for the violation of any of the provisions hereof;" and to repeal said ordinance as now existing.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and Council of the City of Red Cloud: Section 1. That permission and authority is hereby granted to Lloyd M. Crabbil, his successors and assigns to continue the use of and to occupy for the term of Twenty years from April 1, 1910 the certain streets of the city of Red Cloud herein described, for the maintenance and operation of a street railway line, extending from the Burlington

Station as now located into the business part of the city to the present terminus of the line as now existing; subject to the conditions, limitations and regulations herein specified, and to such as may hereafter be lawfully provided by the city not conflicting with the provisions hereof; the said line of railway being substantially the same as that covered by franchise heretofore granted to Finsig Brothers, and to the ownership of which said Crabbil has succeeded.

Section 11. The line of said street railway as authorized is as follows: Commencing at the Burlington Station as now located, thence to Seward Street and north on Seward Street to Division Street; thence west on Division Street to its Junction with Seward Street; thence north on Seward Street to Third Avenue; thence east on Third Avenue to Webster Street; thence north on Webster Street to Fourth Avenue; thence east on Fourth Avenue across its intersection with Elm Street to the present car barn terminus; the same to be a single line of railway only in the center of the street, except for any necessary switches or turnouts; but no switch or turnout shall be made on said line on either Third or Fourth Avenue or Webster Street.

Section 12. Said Lloyd M. Crabbil, his successors or assigns owning or operating such railway shall pay annually on or before the first day of May each year, into the occupation fund of said city an annual advance fee or occupation tax of the sum of Twenty Five Dollars (\$25.00) and on or before May 1, 1910 shall file with the city clerk his acceptance of the terms and provisions of this ordinance, and pay to the Treasurer the said tax for the ensuing year.

Section 13. That the grade, tracks and rails of all street railways, or parts thereof, located or which may be located within the city of Red Cloud, shall be kept and made to conform to the actual grade of the streets where no grade has been established and to any grade which has been established by said city, and in all cases where the tracks of any street railway run lengthwise, for any distance, of any street, alley or highway of said city, the railway tracks and the space between the rails and for the distance of one foot without the line of the rails shall be kept and maintained on a level with the street surface, adjacent to such railway and shall be kept in repair so that such tracks may be crossed easily and freely at any place and in all directions on such alley and highway by wagons, carriages and other vehicles without obstruction to travel on such highways, and it shall be the duty of the person, company or association, owning or operating or conducting any such street railway to cause the provisions of this ordinance to be complied with.

Section 14. Upon its being made to appear to the Mayor and council that the line of tracks of any street railway or any part thereof, within said city does not conform to the requirements of the preceding section of this ordinance, the Mayor and council may, by resolution, direct that any portion, describing it, of such railway or the bed or tracks thereof, be so changed as to conform to said requirements within such reasonable time as may be fixed by said resolution; and the city marshal or street commissioner shall at once give effect to such resolution to the owner, operator or manager of such railway or any person engaged in the actual operation thereof, and if such resolution be not complied with within the time fixed therein the city marshal or street commissioner by direction of the council shall change the location and grade of said tracks to conform to such requirements, or shall remove the same from the highway and level the street surface where the railway was situated, and in either case shall report the expense thereof to the council, which expense shall be recoverable by civil action by the city from the owners and operators of such street railway.

Section 15. Any owner, operator or manager of any street railway mentioned in sections one or two, hereof or any officer or agent or employee of any of them, or any person engaged in the actual operation of such street railway, who shall willfully fail or refuse to comply with or shall obstruct or prevent the carrying out of any of the provisions of this ordinance, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined in any sum not less than one dollar nor more than one hundred dollars.

Section 16. The said Ordinance No. 62, as now existing and all ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict with any of the provisions hereof are hereby repealed; and this ordinance shall be in force from and after its passage, approval and publication according to law.
