Lincoln Letter

Interests today have their preferred candidate for Governor in the person of Mr. Dahlgren, who is commended for his courage by Mr. Bryan, and who stands for a wide open booze policy. The liquor interests were heartily in favor of the repeal of the law prohibiting the establishment of a saloon within a certain distance of Fort Crook. They secured the passage of a bill repealing that law, but despite their every influence and all the pressure they could bring to bear, Governor Shallenberger vetoed the bill and there are no saloons at Fort Crook. If ever the liquor interests exerted themselves to prevent a bill from becoming a law they exerted themselves to prevent a bill from becoming a law they exerted themselves to secure the veto of the eight o'clock closing law. Governor Shallenberger signed that bill despite the frenzied protests of the liquor interests. The liquor interests were opposed to the law forbidding the drinking of intoxicants on the trains, yet Governor Shallenberger signed that bill also. The only progressive liquor legislation in Nebraska in twenty years was enacted by a democratic legislature in Nebraska and approved by a democratic governor. Yet despite these plain proofs that Governor Shallenberger is in no way tied up with the liquor interests, Mr. Bryan charges the contrary by inference if not by direct language.

County Option may or may not be an issue that political parties should take a definite stand upon. That is a question men of all parties must decide for themselves. But in view of all the facts it would seem that any charge that Governor Shallenberger is in any way allied with the liquor interests must fall of its own weight.

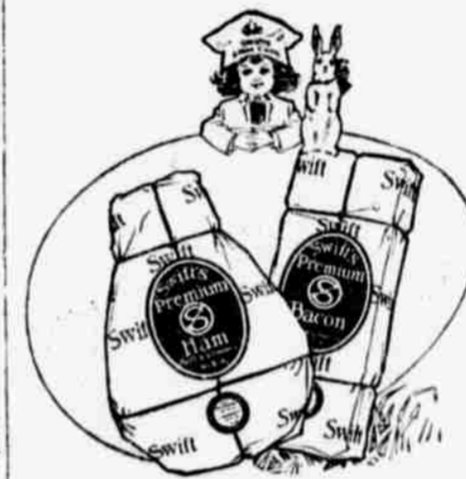
Governor Shallenberger has appointed Rev. I. F. Roach of Lincoln to be a member of the State Normal School board, succeeding H. M. Childs of York, whose term has expired. Rev. Mr. Roach's appointment will bear date of September 1st, in order to give the board as now constituted opportunity to wind up business on hand with which it is familiar. Rev. Roach is pastor of St. Paul's M. E. church in Lincoln.

The coming election reminds us that an unusual opportunity presents itself to the unselfish citizenship of Nebraska to insist upon a legislature that shall be truly representative. Nebraska people enjoy the distinction of having a less percentage of illiteracy

than any of the other states. Nebraska people keep abreast of the times and know all sides of all questions. They read and digest everything from garden planting to politics and can converse intelligently upon any subject of current interest. But there is one thing lacking. As far as political matters are concerned our people seem to be content to solve problems simply for the pleasure of reducing a puzzle to its beginnings and then they stop. The time has come to reverse former practices and to take an active part in selecting representatives to our state legislature who will act for the best interests of the state regardless of political influence. The stay-at-homes have contented themselves in the past with the comforting thought that the politicians will control and the result has been that in most cases individual nests were feathered and the party glorified. Less than one tenth of the voting population take any part in the nominating of candidates and this is owing largely to the fact that it requires the sacrifice of an hour from their labors. It is a reproach that so much intelligence should go to waste. We cannot be truly good citizens unless we take an active part in the affairs of our country. Let every voter pledge himself right now that he will attend the primaries and register his judgment. Let him exercise a little unselfishness and do a little work for his country. We would like to see a law passed that would refuse men from voting at the general election who did not participate in the selection of candidates at the primary.
