**LINCOLN LETTER** LINCOLN, NEBR., July 20.—(Special Correspondence.) Governor Schallenberg has increased his great popularity throughout the state by the wise and practical statement issued by him on the political situation in Nebraska. The Governor does not set himself up as a dictator nor bigger than his party, but he believes the democrats of Nebraska should have something to say about what the party platform shall be rather than listening to the arrogant dictation of any individual. In other words democrats believe that nobody knows more than everybody. The statement reads: I have read Mr. Bryan's statement recently issued in which he comments upon my not calling an extra session of the Legislature and also expresses his views as to what the next democratic platform should contain. He is much disappointed because I did not call an extra session, but it will be remembered that when I issued my statement, following my return to the state when I found the movement for an extra session started, I made plain the requirements that I thought necessary before I would be warranted in calling the members together, and Mr. Bryan accepted them and agreed that they were reasonable. Although two months were consumed in securing the pledges, these conditions were not complied with, and in the meantime Mr. Bryan has sailed to Europe, and the sentiment against an extra session grew to overwhelming proportions. I do not ask to divide the responsibility for my action in not calling the extra session, and my reasons were clearly stated in my statement issued at the time I announced position in that matter. No executive decision of mine, since I have been in office, has met with more universal approval than my action in this matter. Mr. Bryan is of the opinion that my not calling the extra session has precipitated the county option question into this campaign, but the extra session could only have determined his action in the matter. The organized forces in this state who have been long fighting for county option never agreed to the putting of this question aside. This organization through its president served notice upon me that Mr. Bryan could only speak for himself, and that the issue would still be acute as ever, no matter whether I called the session or not. In my judgment, it will so remain until settled by a direct vote of the people, made possible by the initiative and referendum, as I have stated in my speeches delivered in different parts of the state. The matter in which I have differed with Mr. Bryan, is as to the advisability of making county option the principal issue in this campaign. I believe that the right of the people to legislate for themselves under the initiative and referendum is of more importance than any other question now before the voters of Nebraska, and since "to shoot at the neck is often to miss out entirely" my own idea has been that to obtain this great privilege in a satisfactory form, we should make it the central issue in the campaign.
