LINCOLN LETTER.

However, I do not seek to dictate to my party. I do not claim rights of leadership or attempt to make its platform in advance of the assembling of the delegates at the convention. I stated my views plainly at Central City and until the party speaks in its platform I shall hold to the advice given at the time.

If a substantial victory for the temperance forces of this state is the thing to be desired, it is well to consider the judgement of those old in the faith, as well as that of new converts. I observe that so good a judge of republican politics, and a county optionist as well, Mayor Love, is quoted only yesterday as saying that the republican party will not put county option in its platform this year. Many other leaders of that party will not put county option in its platform this year. Many other leaders of that party have told me the same thing. I am willing to risk my political judgement by agreeing with them in this matter. In a speech made at Lincoln a short time ago, evidently prepared with great care and delivered for the purpose of informing county optionists as to the effect of political action in this matter upon the county option question, the national superintendent of the anti-saloon league, speaking with the knowledge obtained by their experience in other states, said, it would be a great mistake to have one party declare for county option and the other refuse to do so.

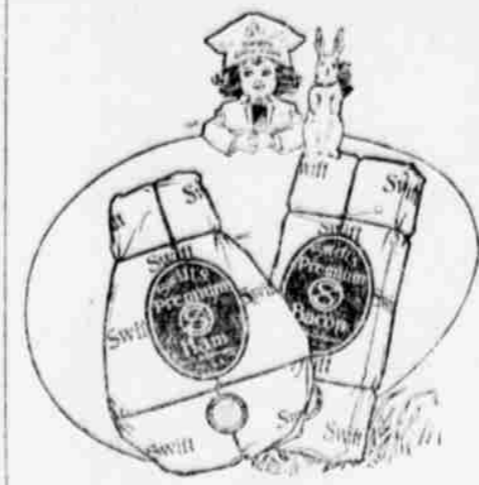
Mr. Bryan disagrees with me upon making direct legislation the issue on this campaign, and letting county option was at stake before the last legislature, and he was appealed to give it his support. Mr. Bryan said, "Wait until we get the initiative and referendum." When I was asked to call the extra session, Mr. Bryan gave it as his reason for asking me to call the legislature together that county option could thus be made to wait upon the adoption of a direct legislation amendment. I am only now advertising for the party's action what Mr. Bryan has so constantly urged in the past. But he says my failure to call an extra session makes the liquor question an issue in our party. But this question became an issue in the democratic party before Mr. Bryan spoke out upon it. When I vetoed the "Fort Crook Bill" and signed the daylight saloon bill in the face of threats that I wrote my own political death warrant if I approved that measure, the democratic party has this issue put before it. As in other matters I have been compelled to decide since I have been governor of the state, I acted, first, upon my own judgement and conscience as to what I believed was right and for the best interests of the people of the state, and, secondly, for the good of my party. The moment I signed the "Daylight Saloon Bill," the organized liquor interests of this state decreed I must be beaten at next election. The first battle will be at the primary.

I received more votes when I was elected than any candidate ever received in Nebraska for any office, except President Roosevelt in the campaign of 1904, and by all the rules of Nebraska politics I was entitled to a re-nomination without a struggle. Mayor Dahlman has been brought out to defeat me. If he can do it my defeat will be a warning to all future politicians in Nebraska to never dare to stand up against the liquor interests.

The issue between democracy and decency upon one hand and the lawless liberty of unbridled license upon the other is clearly understood by the people of Nebraska, and I am ready to meet the fight along this line. The people of this state are the most independent and intelligent voters of those of any state of which I have knowledge. The pretty jealousies and strifes of contending politicians, who are struggling for party control, etc., will cut but little figure. A great many more Nebraskans will always be upon the side of right than upon the side of wrong, but the issue cannot be be-fogged nor turned aside. He that is not for me is against me. I propose to go on fighting as long as I hold my office, to maintain an administration that shall win the support of the people of this state, irrespective of party, if I can, to convince them that good government and democratic go hand in hand. I am a Nebraskan before I am a democrat, but a member of that party and one who was always contended for its right to rule in this state. I shall continue to strive to fight for those things that I think are essential to good government to lengthen the party in every way possible, not divide it upon questions that are not vital but to unite it upon great principals such as direct legislation, which carries with it the satisfactory solution of county option and many other questions more important still. What is needed in this state just at present is the decent respect and observance of laws already upon the statute books concerning the liquor traffic, and this office is chiefly concerned with the enforcement of the law.

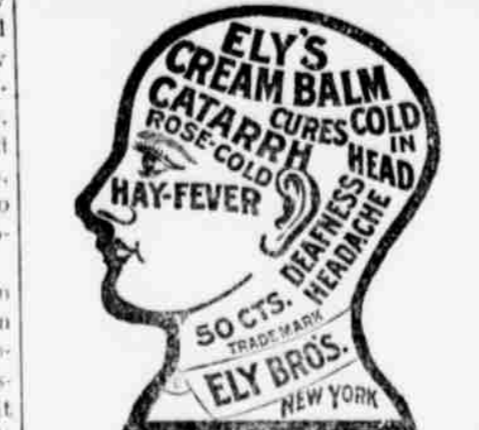
I am willing to leave to the demo-

CLING TO ANCIENT METHODS

Many Egyptian Farmers To-Day Use Tools Such as Ancestors Had Centuries Ago.

"One of the curious sights in the Egyptian harvest season is a modern threshing machine noisily working in a field adjoining that in which a native thresher is treading out the grain," said a Chicagoan, who has made a tour of the world in the interests of American farming implements.

The brown-skinned tiller of the soil, clad in his flowing robes of white or the favored dull blue and yellow combination sitting on the high seat of the crude thresher, which is dragged over the fields by a yoke of patient camels or perhaps a camel and a donkey or a couple of buffalo cows, appears to the stranger who sees this for the first time like the principal actor in a scene worked out by an ingenious mind for stage effect.

"The native plow in Egypt is simply the forked portion of a tree or two pieces joined together and smoothed off, a primitive contrivance which may still be seen in use by Cuban farmers. The thresher is a sledge-like affair fitted with round crushers of wood or iron and weighted down from the top. The grain is crushed into the ground and when gathered up it is mixed with lumps of mud, but it is said that never a kernel of it is lost or wasted.

"American farming machinery may be found in the remotest parts of the world and where least expected. In what manner it gets there I could not ascertain. The natives could not enlighten me."

MARINERS' FEARS OF FOGS

Numerous Safeguards Devised for Protection Against Dire Peril of the Ocean.

Probably the greatest menace to the safety of navigation at sea is the fog. Modern steamships are seldom endangered by the severest storms, but when the impenetrable envelope of mist encloses a vessel, she is exposed to the most terrible of perils—a collision at sea. A single ship may be comparatively safe even in a fog, but when there is a fleet of vessels the danger is greatly multiplied. In addition to the customary fog-horns and sirens a fleet of warships often will keep informed of their relative positions by the firing of signal-guns from the flagship. Another excellent method generally employed is the use of the fog-buoy. Each vessel in a warship fleet carries a fog buoy, a large cask painted a bright red. This is cast overboard at the first sign of any fog and floats from the stern of the vessel attached by a rope of grass fiber which does not sink beneath the surface of the water. Sufficient rope is paid out by each vessel, so that its fog buoy floats at the bow of the ship next "orn—two cables' length (400 yards) when in close order and double that distance in open order. By this means the exact stations of the individual ships of a fleet are maintained, even though proceeding at a moderate rate of speed.
