**That Water Problem**

The water problem of our city still remains unsettled after two propositions have been uselessly submitted for a probable wasteful expenditure of the tax payers funds in experimental extension work.

In Mondays issue of the Commercial Advertiser we read a very interesting article advocating the utilizing of the Maurer springs in our water system.

During all these years there has been an undercurrent of opinion favorable to the Maurer springs proposition. This undercurrent of opinion has been steadily growing and expanding until now it has become the manifest opinion of many of our most serious and thinking citizens. All summer long in nearly every conversation concerning our water supply the Maurer springs proposition has found an earnest sincere but usually a timid advocate. Any man of experience will readily tell you that had the Maurer springs been located anywhere else but at Red Cloud they would have been furnishing the municipal water supply for these many years.

Long, long ago this bountiful waste of pure cool refreshing water should have been harnessed for our municipal water supply. It should have been dissolving the soap for the suds in our laundries and dissolving the suds and cooling the fevered brains of our thirsty inhabitants.

Already enough money has been spent in fruitless experimental attempts to secure a water supply to have brought down the sure supply from Maurer's springs two or three times. And now for our city to spend \$1000 or \$1800 more in experimenting in that water barren locality seems preposterous. We have the assurance from a competent engineer that the Maurer springs can be turned into our water system at a total cost of less than \$5000, including a spacious reservoir at this end and a thorough sanitary protection at the springs.

Bro. Hosmer we are with you on the water proposition.
