Mr. and Mrs. John Rasser and Mrs. George McKinie Sunday at John Holcombs.

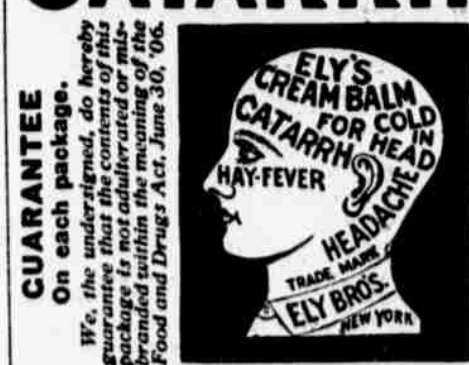
Misses Ella and Grace White and Ina Drake visited Saturday and Sunday with Miss Clara and Lena Rasser.

This is a Democratic year.

The September election in Maine has sounded the keynote of Republican success for forty years. This year the keynote from the Pine Tree State is a noise that sounds like "de-fer" for the G. O. P.

If we were living under county option, the defendant that it be displaced by local option would be a progressive measure, but the defendant that local option be displaced by county option is decidedly a prohibitory measure.

Under the terms of 1910 the state will have to be redistricted into senatorial and representative districts. It is important that we have a Democratic legislature to do the redistricting in order to have a square deal and safeguard the rights of the party.

The United German societies of Nebraska, at the celebration of the anniversary of the landing of the first German colonists in America in 1683, held in Lincoln, Oct. 6, unanimously passed resolutions condemning county option as a cunningly devised move of the prohibitionists.

The wisdom of the law for the regulation of the liquor traffic that has been in force in Nebraska for thirty years is fully vindicated by results. Under this law the evils of liquor drinking are minimized and the growth of temperance sentiment has been constant and healthy.

The platform adopted by the recent New York state Democratic convention would be regarded as tinged with Populism twenty years ago. Even the Populists at that time did not demand that the nomination of candidates for public office be made by the popular vote.

The phrase "wets and dries" is a misnomer in the present campaign. This phrase applies only to contests under our local option laws between those favoring and those opposing the granting of licenses. Prohibition does not mean "dry." It means from five to ten places where liquors are sold contrary to law to every one place where it would be sold under a license legally granted, subject to regulations prescribed by state laws.

The attempt of county optionists to convey the idea that they are not advocating prohibition, pure and simple, is as shallow minded as it is dishonest. The object and purpose of county option is to secure county prohibition wherever it can be done. An affirmative vote on the license question in a county does not change the present laws at all, while a negative vote means prohibition for the county. Therefore, there can be no reason urged in favor of the change except the desire to put the towns, villages and cities of the county under a prohibitory law wherever it is possible for this to be done.

Senator Burkett refuses to meet Gilbert M. Hitchcock upon the rostrum and defend his record in congress before the people. His answer to the criticisms of Whedon and Hitchcock is, "fastifiers." It is fortunate for the voters that the daily doings of congress is printed verbatim in the Congressional Record, thus becoming public property. But Burkett is shifty and slippery and believes he can dodge answering to the people for his support of the Aldrich tariff schedules more successfully by calling honest men liars than in meeting them in public debate, with the Congressional Record as arbiter of disputed facts.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT.

The following proposed amendment to the constitution of the State of Nebraska, as hereinafter set forth in full, is submitted to the electors of the State of Nebraska, to be voted upon at the general election to be held Tuesday, November 8th, A. D. 1910:

A JOINT RESOLUTION to amend Section one (1) of Article seven (7) of the Constitution of the State of Nebraska.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Nebraska:

Section 1. (Amendment constitution proposed.) That section one (1) of article seven (7) of the constitution of the state of Nebraska, the senate concurring, be so amended as to read as follows:

Section 1. (Who are electors.) Every male citizen of the United States, of the age of twenty-one years, who shall have been a resident of this state six months next preceding the election and of the county, precinct, or ward, for the term provided by law shall be an elector; provided, that persons of foreign birth who shall have declared their intention to become citizens conformably to the laws of the United States and are voting at the taking effect of this amendment may continue to exercise the right of suffrage until such time as they may have resided in the United States five years, after which they shall take out full citizenship papers to be entitled to vote at any succeeding election.

Section 2. (Ballots.) That at the general election nineteen hundred and ten (1910) there shall be submitted to the electors of the state for their approval or rejection the foregoing proposed amendment to the constitution relating to the right of suffrage. At such election, on the ballot of each elector voting for or against said proposed amendment, shall be written or printed the words: "For proposed amendment to the constitution relating to the right of suffrage," and "Against said proposed amendment to the constitution relating to the right of suffrage."

Section 3. (Adoption) If such amendment shall be approved by a majority of all electors voting at such election, said amendment shall constitute section one (1) of article seven (7) of the constitution of the State of Nebraska.

Approved April 1, 1909.

I, Geo. C. Junkin, Secretary of State, of the State of Nebraska do hereby certify that the foregoing proposed amendment to the Constitution of the State of Nebraska is a true and correct copy of the original enrolled and engrossed bill, as passed by the thirty-first session of the legislature of the State of Nebraska, as appears from said original bill on file in this office, and that said proposed amendment is submitted to the qualified voters of the state of Nebraska for their adoption or rejection at the general election to be held on Tuesday, the 8th day of November, A. D. 1910.

In Testimony Whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and affixed the great seal of the State of Nebraska. Done at Lincoln, this 29th day of July, in the year of our Lord, One Thousand Nine Hundred and Ten, and of the Independence of the United States the One Hundred and Thirty-fifth, and of this State the Forty-fourth.

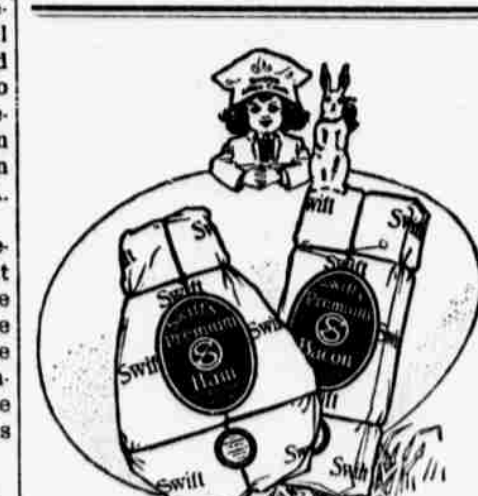
