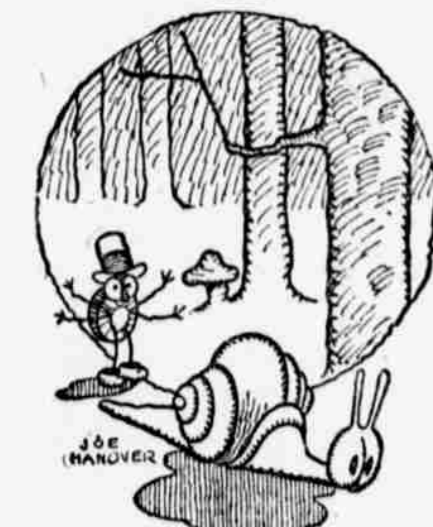
Reason for Strange Names.

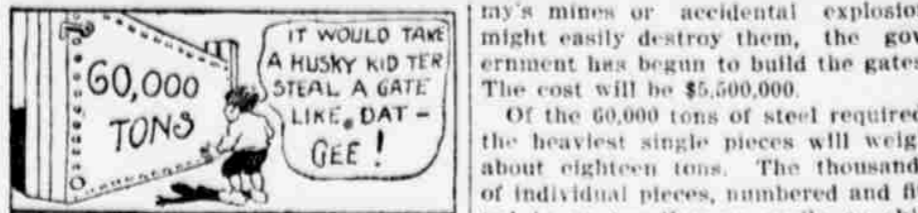

HAPPENINGS IN THE CITIES

Forging the Big Panama Canal Gates



PITTSBURG, PA.—Mischievous boys dreaming of gates to be carried away and future Halloween trophies would not in the wildest nightmares imagine such enormous gates as are being made in Pittsburgh for the Panama canal.

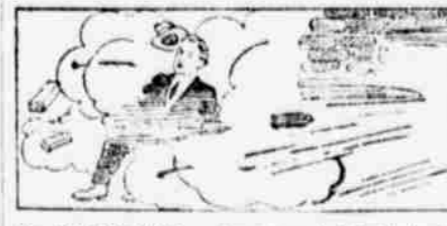
They will be the largest gates in the world. Any one of the 92 of them will be about as high as a six-story building, as wide as many city buildings are (65 feet), and seven feet deep or thick.

The structural steel that will go to make them will weigh 66,000 tons, or more than eight times as much as was used to build the Eiffel tower in Paris.

The mighty portals, designed to admit a world's commerce from one ocean to another, must withstand a tide of criticism as well as a tremendous pressure of water and possible convulsions of earth. For years the controversy over gates or no gates, locks or sea level, has been the dividing issue of the canal project.

In the face of fear in some quarters that the foundations on the isthmus are not sure enough for locks, that earthquakes or water pressure would dislodge them, and that an ene-

Everybody Helps to Make City Clean



KANSAS CITY, KAN.—The Armourdale district has set the pace and now this city is going to be a spotless town. An idea, a circular letter and a few postage stamps did the work in Armourdale.

Mr. Dean, commissioner of parks, selected the town-cleaning day and then mailed the letters to all of the business and professional men in that part of town, inviting them to meet, properly equipped with implements, at Shawnee park. As early as 7:30 the Shawnee park district looked like a brickyard district when a mad-dog alarm has been sounded. PHILADELPHIA, PA.—Lying in the Garretson hospital in a critical condition from a badly lacerated scalp, which he sustained when hit by a street car, Albert Maxwell, fifty-one years of age, steadfastly refuses to drink water in any form because he doesn't like it. He declares he has been a total abstainer from nature's beverage for the last thirty years, and is willing to take a chance of giving up his life rather than touch water again.

When Maxwell was taken to the hospital he was placed on the operating table while the physicians sewed

my's mines or accidental explosion might easily destroy them, the government has begun to build the gates. The cost will be \$5,500,000.

Of the 60,000 tons of steel required, the heaviest single pieces will weigh about eighteen tons. The thousands of individual pieces, numbered and fitted to go together as easily as children's blocks, will be shipped by steamer via Baltimore and with them will go more than four hundred skilled structural steel builders from Pittsburgh to set them. The advance guard of experts will leave here in December and the first work probably will begin early in 1911.

The location of the 46 pairs of gates will be, 20 at the Gatun dam on the Pacific side, 12 at Pedro Miguel, and 14 at Miraflores, near the Atlantic entrance. The gates are designed to hold back water 47.4 feet deep in a channel 110 feet wide, which means a pressure of a million pounds. The weight of a single gate will be about 600 tons, and the dimensions are 77 to 82 feet high, 60 to 75 feet wide and 7 feet thick.

Each block will be ample for a ship 50 per cent. larger than any vessel afloat, and it has been estimated that as many as a hundred ocean ships may be handled in a single day.

There are no locks approaching these in size. The famous Suez canal is a sea level affair and the few great lock canals would have to combine their gates to equal the size and strength of the great doors of Panama.

DRAINAGE WORK IS NOW DUE

Some Very Important Suggestions for Laying Out Plans Which Will Bring Best Results.

The average life of the drains in many soils is probably not more than twenty-five years, and even if the drains are not as old as that they may have become blocked by roots of trees or sinkage of individual pipes.

The point then to decide will be whether to take up part of the system and relay, or commence an entirely new one. In the majority of cases it will be found that it is most satisfactory to lay down an entirely new system and this is the course generally adopted.

In laying out a new scheme of the drainage the following are the main points that will require investigation before the working plan can be prepared or the work commenced.

No rule of thumb can be given, but it may be said that on the heavier clays a distance apart of six yards and an average depth of two feet, nine inches would be ample while on the lighter sands and wet gravels 20 yards apart and an average of three feet, three inches for depth would not be too much.

As a general rule on medium soils minor drains are set eleven dium soils minor drains are set eleven

Drains need not to be so near together on arable as in grass land. Drains should be at an average of six inches deeper than the side drains.

Main drains should have a fall of not less than one in 250 or about 20 feet per mile. The actual position of minors with reference to the slope has been the subject of much discussion, but where the fall is fairly good they may be taken across the slope and this is generally the most practicable way.

The number of square yards in an acre (4,840) divided by the distance apart of the minors will give the total length of side drains per acre. This, if the side drains are 11 yards apart, their total length on an acre of ground will be 440 yards.

Choosing the positions for the outfalls is often by no means an easy task, but it may be taken as a principle that the fewer outfalls there are the better, as each requires to be cleaned out periodically, and if there is a multiplication of them one or the other is certain to be overworked some time. The outfall should be placed as far above the water level of the stream or ditch into which it empties as circumstances will allow, but if there is any chance of flood-water backing up the drain, this must be provided against by fastening a hinged flap over the end of the outfall pipe.

In the selection of tiles great care should be taken for in this as in many other things the strength of a chain is its weakest link, and through the "flying" of a main drain the greater part of an entire drainage system may be rendered comparatively useless.

DEVICE FOR HUSKING CORN

Metal Plate Fits in Palm of Husker's Hand and Has Projecting Hooks to Catch Husk.

If some clever young farmer could wear concealed the corn husker designed by an Illinois man, he could win with ease all the husking bees in his locality. This husker is a metal plate fastened to a glove-like device which fits on the lower part of the hand, bringing the plate in the palm. On the lower part of the husker is a downwardly projecting hook, while above it, on either side are two other hooks, projecting in the opposite directions. Each of these spikes is made by cutting two sides of a triangle in the metal and bend-

ing over the point thus made. The lower hook is meant to engage the husk as the hand is drawn down over the ear of corn and strip it off. The other two projections, having nothing to interfere with their progress downward, act as guides and ensure the husk of being stripped off evenly. Ordinarily, in husking corn, the husk is seized at the top and pulled down. With this device the outer covering of the corn is gripped by the mere downward movement of the hand.

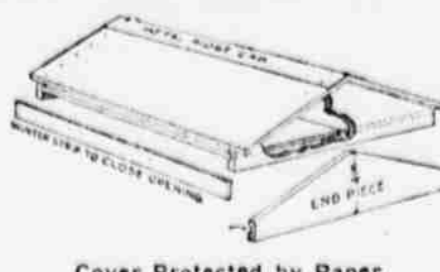
PLACE HANDLES ON BARREL

Old Shovels May Be Utilized in Making Places for Hands—Good Method is Shown.

COVER PROTECTED BY PAPER

Important Part of Hive is Shelter That Will Be Cool in Summer and Warm in Winter.

An important part of a good hive is a cover that will be cool in summer and warm in winter. Of course, if one winters indoors it does not make so much difference. But most

of the bee-keepers around here winter outdoors and, take but little care of their bees at that.

I like the flat paper-top cover quite well, and always order it, but prefer a cover made like the one shown here, writes Elmer E. Walte, in Gleanings in Bee Culture. I have used several that I made myself, and like them better than any other cover for a single-walled hive. The inside (flat) part can be made either of two or three pieces. The outside (top) should be two pieces if the ridge is narrow, but can be made of four pieces if the whole top is covered with paper. The outside should project over the ends two inches, or one and one-half inches at least, and fastened with several small nails. If the whole top is covered with paper there will never be any trouble from the ends of the boards splitting. I have had no trouble from this cause. A strip of sheet metal can be used for the ridge-cap, or roofing paper will do if nailed with tacks.

BARREL HANDLES

Use two old shovel handles cutting them to the proper length and trim on an angle as seen in the picture. Fasten these on opposite sides, fastening each very securely with screws.

This is a handy way to move a barrel. If a top to the barrel is desired fasten a large thread spool in the center with a screw. Any barrel containing water or other liquid should be kept covered.

FARM NOTES

Leaves are fine for lining the storage pits.

Don't neglect to provide ample ventilation for the cellar.

Crates, barrels and boxes for cellar storage must be clean and dry.

Fruit and vegetables retain a much richer flavor if buried than if stored in the cellar.

If there are broken panes in the barn windows, now is the time to put in new ones.

Seed potatoes, like table stock, should be stored as cold as possible without frost.

Fall plowed land should be left rough over winter to better catch and hold the snow.

Don't spend a dollar for small ditches or tile on a marsh until an outlet is assured.

Put the potatoes designed for seed purposes in barrels or bins where they can be kept from the light.

Drainage tiles should be evenly and well burnt, giving a clear, ringing note when clinked together.

To keep a plow from rusting coat the moldboard with axle grease or with linseed oil when not in use.

Do not put any frozen potatoes away into winter storage with unfrozen ones, if it can possibly be avoided.

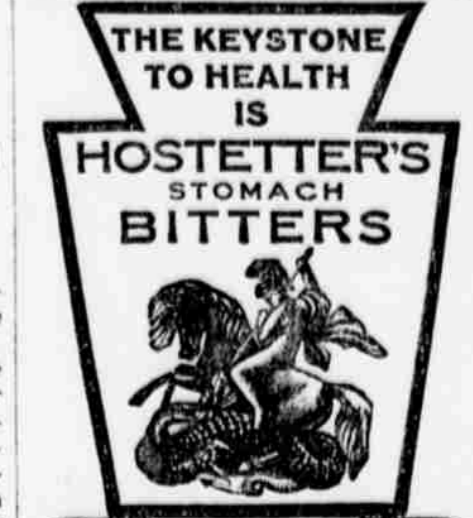
This month is a good time to spray the interior of the barn with lime wash. A spray pump used for this purpose will do much for cleanliness and health.
