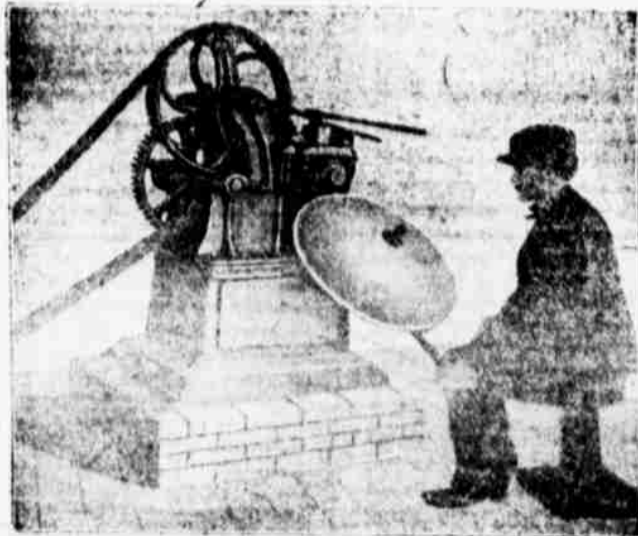

THE LEGISLATURE

Marked progress has been made dur-
ing the first twenty days of the pres-
ent legislative session. Of course the
heavy work is done in committees and
for this reason the sessions have been
arranged to allow the greatest opportu-
nity for the committees to meet and
consider the merits of the bills intro-
duced. There always seems to be a de-
mand on the part of the public for a
short session—this in the interest of
economy—but the facts are, that legis-
lators are paid by the day for their
work and must put in at least sixty
days and can receive pay for only that
amount of time.

The two measures that loom large in
the Thirty-second session are the
Initiative and Referendum and County
Option. No one has breathed a doubt
that the former measure will pass but
it is uncertain in just what form it
will finally be enrolled. Senator Skiles
of Butler County and Representative
Hatfield introduced bills identically
alike in their respective houses and
the consideration of the measure began
in the Senate where others sought to
introduce amendments that would
tend to make the enactment more con-
servative than as originally introduced.
As democrats and republicans alike
are practically pledged by their plat-
forms to endorse direct legislation it is
merely a question of judgment as to
what is best to write into the bill.

Whatever the House may do with
the county option bill it is generally
thought that the measure cannot pass
the Senate, where it must have seven-
teen votes. Thirteen of the fourteen
republican members of the upper
house, and three democrats, are pledg-
ed to its support but Bartling, republi-
can, is the unknown quantity. Both
sides have claimed him but the prev-
ailing opinion seems to be that he
will not vote for any county option
bill that will be satisfactory to its out-
spoken friends.

Capitol removal is being talked seri-
ously and a bill introduced in the
House is signed by twenty-eight mem-
bers. A poll of the Senate encourages
the "removalists" to believe that they
can pass their bill and get the matter
submitted to the voters of the state.
It is undisputed that the Capitol build-
ing at Lincoln is getting "ratty" and
there seems to be little disposition to
make an appropriation for repairs or
alteration.

Governor Aldrich hurled a bomb
when he delivered a special message a
fortnight ago calling attention to
election frauds in Omaha. The House
immediately accepted the challenge
and appointed a special committee
with full power to investigate. The
committee went to Omaha a week ago
and evidence is being taken. The
Senate was more tardy in taking ac-
tion but appointed a special committee,
headed by Judge Albert, last Friday
and the two committees will work in
conjunction. A careful study of the
personnel of the joint committee leav-
es no doubt that a full investigation
will be had and the truth, whatever it
may be, unearthed and made public.

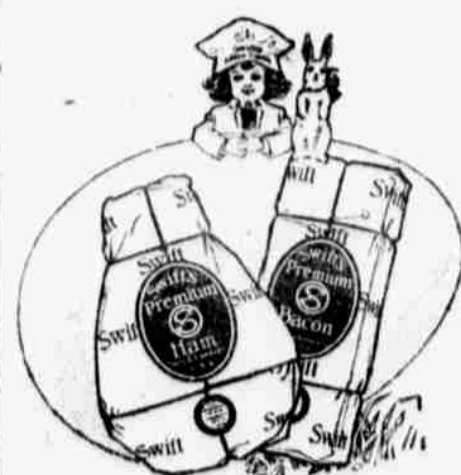
