THE LEGISLATURE

The Mc'rew bill, seeking to amend
the bank guarantee law of two years
ago, which has lately been held valid
by the United States Supreme Court,
is argued by some as amounting to
little more nor less than an act to re-
peal the Nebraska Bank Guarantee
Law. Strange as it may seem, the
feeling in the House and Senate on
this matter is pronouncedly different,
due perhaps to the fact that the per-
sonnel of the Senate is largely made
up of bankers and lawyers, while in
the House the farmers and depositors
predominate. Owners of state banks
are making much less ado about the
provisions of the law than owners of
National banks, who are but indirect-
ly affected.

According to the Nebraska Consti-
tution, a regular session of the Leg-
islature must continue for sixty legis-
lative days, and may not run more
than ninety days, but the members
can only draw pay for sixty days; ac-
cordingly the Nebraska Solons have
been working on their own time since
Wednesday, March 29th.

The date for final adjournment was
set late last week for Thursday, April
6th, but it was done with the full
knowledge of the fact that all of the
work necessary to be finished could
not be completed at that time. It is
reasonable to suppose that the gavel
will finally fall on adjournment sine
die at some hour Saturday, April 8th,
which will mark the close of one of
the most strenuous sessions of the Ne-
braska Legislature.

At the request of Governor Aldrich,
House Roll No 703 was introduced by
Representative Eastman, and by its
provisions there will be established a
department of construction and re-
pairs with a competent man in charge,
under the appointment of the Govern-
or, to look after the construction, re-
pair, and maintenance of all public
buildings. It is probable that this
department will only exist until the
new law providing for a Board of Con-
trol shall become effective.

The Legislative apportionment bill
as it passed the Senate has been ap-
proved by the House without amend-
ments. The Congressional apportion-
ment bill has been hung up in the
Senate. Some think that the new
Congress will cut down its member-
ship, thereby reducing Nebraska to
five districts instead of six. In this
event it would seem unwise to reap-
portion the state into six districts at
this time. Of course there have been
many selfish interests working both
for and against a Congressional ap-
portionment.

The farmer folks will certainly be
pleased to know that both branches of
the Legislature have passed a bill pro-
viding for payment by the State of
two-thirds of the value of an animal
which is condemned and killed by a
veterinarian because of glanders.

Another evidence of the generosity
of the Legislature in dealing with
educational institutions is the passage
of a bill providing for ample state aid
for weak school districts which can-
not afford five months school every
year. The bill carries an appropriation
of \$75,000.

Whether or not the State Univer-
sity will be removed from the City of
Lincoln to the Farm campus adjoining
the city limits, is a problem at the
time this is written. There is a pro-
nounced sentiment in favor of remov-
al, but the \$4,000,000, estimated ex-
pense attendant upon the change is
viewed with alarm by the watch dogs
of the treasury.

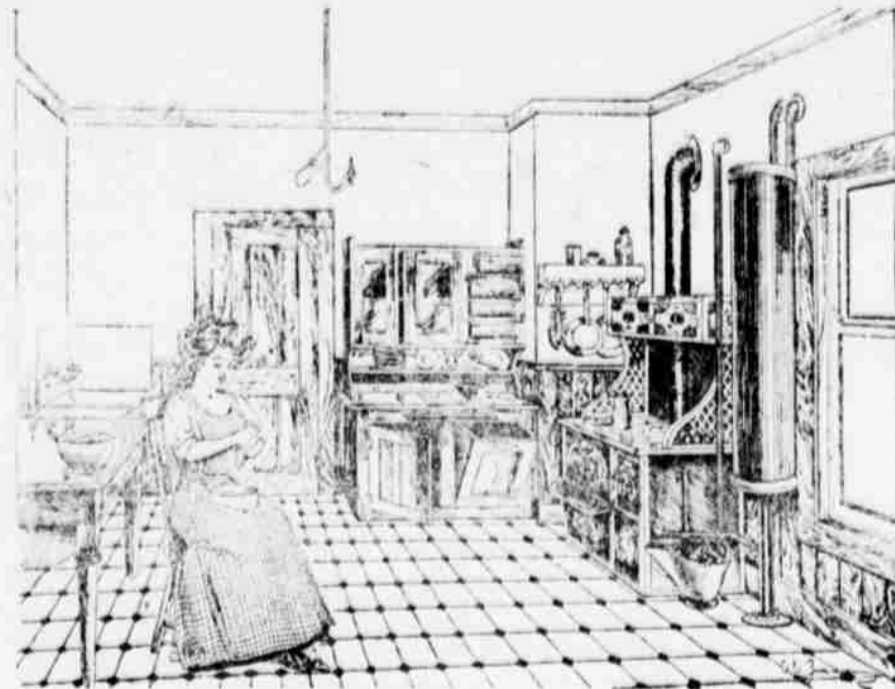
