Cooked by escaping steam until his flesh fell from his bones, this spake, Tom Gately, one of the victims of the Indianola wreck last Tuesday.
Smiling through his horrible pain, although the smile cracked the steamed flesh on his face, Gately said: "Every little bit helps," as a friend laid a cold cloth upon his cooked forehead.
"I'm all in—help the women!"

Tom Gately was a wrestler by profession. But he was more than that—he was a man, every inch of him.
