### Commissioner Furse

William J. Furse is at the present time the only democratic official at the state house. He was appointed to the railway commission by Governor Shallenberger a year ago to fill the vacancy caused by the death of W. H. Cowgill. Mr. Furse is a young man possessing the energy and habits of mind which are required of the position he is filling at the present time. He has applied himself to the problems of ratemaking, physical valuation and general traffic matters in a way which has already proven the value of his services to the people of Nebraska and promises still more for the future if he is retained on the railway commission.

By all ordinary rules of politics, Commissioner Furse, having made a good record during his first tenure, is entitled to re-nomination. This rule, it would seem, should hold good all the more in his case because he has not even had one full term as yet. This is not to say that others who aspire to the place have no right to ask for it, but from the public standpoint it would be exceedingly unwise to turn out a good servant just as he is becoming familiar with the matters in his charge, and put some untried person in his place.

Not one single charge has been made against the integrity of Mr. Furse, nor has his capacity for the work of the railway commission been questioned. The only chance of defeating him for the democratic nomination appears to be in some sort of a gumshoe campaign which may be made in the interest of someone else. It has been rumored that the railroads have men in view whom they would like to see nominated on both the democratic and republican tickets.

The democrats of Nebraska cannot afford to let Mr. Furse be defeated in any such way as this.

Why should Commissioner Furse not be re-nominated in the primaries? And why should he not be re-elected in November?—The Lincoln Daily Star.

### Owning a Home.

Nothing is a greater bar to progress and prosperity than uncertainty. When a radical congress is in session business waits; when crops are uncertain farmers keep their cash; when an election is pending financiers withhold loans. Everywhere uncertainty causes a suspension of activity. Relieve the uncertainty and activity is resumed and business goes ahead.

Merely to live has its business aspects; to hedge oneself about with uncertainties as to future plans is to shut off many opportunities for financial advancement and general improvement. In no phase of existence is this uncertainty more powerful in its effects than with respect to residence. The man who does not know where he is to live from year to year is like the tree that is constantly replanted—he does not take root and grow anywhere. This is so true that ownership of real estate presumes prosperity and interest in local affairs and lack of one presumes lack of the other. Besides his own feeling of uncertainty to deter him from making permanent advancement the renter has to combat the public's presumption of his lack of interest.

The renter not only loses the advantages already mentioned, but he contributes his labor and money to the improvement, upkeep and beautifying of another's property and is deprived in this way of investments that would be for his own benefit if he owned the property. Most persons labor to give a good appearance to the house and grounds of their residence whether they own it or not. A large part of this labor is of permanent value to the owner and is in effect a gift made by the renter. Knowledge of this fact alone often prevents the renter from making improvements that he otherwise would make.

The home of a family largely reflects its character and the house that is planned by the family and built to order can be made more nearly to meet that family's needs than any house it may casually rent. The renter moving from house to house always labors under difficulties in accommodating his household furniture to the arrangement of the rooms, and the careful woman of the house is constantly irritated by the inevitable mistakes, which if not endured are only cured at the expense of frequent purchases.

But the owning of a home carries with it intangible benefits not measured in any medium of exchange. To the family reared in the old homestead every room has a history and about the whole house cluster memories too tender and too sacred to be expressed in words, for after all the world is largely governed by matters of sentiment. Where is the person

who would not gladly, if he could, buy the old homestead to prevent its destruction by an owner to whom it is nothing but an old house to be removed to give place to a modern structure? The habit of moving from place to place—and it is largely a habit—is peculiarly American, and it is a serious fault. For by that habit Americans deprive themselves of all home sentiment, a really important element in the makeup of the well rounded out character.

Preparations are now well under way to have Nebraska handsomely and effectively represented at the Omaha Land Show from October 10 to 25th. Commercial and development associations in various parts of the state have gone earnestly to work gathering and arranging for agricultural and other specimens that will make the finest display to be seen at the Land Show. Realizing that much is due to the State of Nebraska, since it is the home state of the Land Show, the management has selected the most desirable section of the immense Coliseum for the exhibits. The Nebraska section is in the most prominent part of the building on the stage. The exhibits that will be placed there will be seen from any point in the huge structure. Whether a visitor to the Land Show be in the midst of a throng on the main floor or arena, or whether he be in the opposite end of the building on the balcony he will observe the Nebraska display standing out prominently.

The University of Nebraska will be represented by an educational exhibit collected by the university at Lincoln, and professors of that institution will be here to hold what will practically be a farmers institute on a big scale.

Besides this exhibit there will be many individual displays. The Chadron Commercial Club has already planned to give a big Dawes County Exhibit. This was the only county to make an exhibit at the show in January, and so profitable was this exploit that the club will come in October to eclipse all other efforts in the line of boosting. Arrangements are also being made for a Sheridan county exhibit under the auspices of the Sheridan County Boosters Association. Brown and Cherry counties will also be represented.

A feature of the forthcoming show that will be of especial interest to the farmers of Nebraska is the farm machinery department. At the National Corn Exposition the implement department drew the attention of the very best farmers. This feature was missed by them at the Land Show in January, and to meet this interest an implement department has been arranged. All classes of farm machinery used in the west will be shown. Machinery Hall will be located just south of the main exposition building and the entrances to the two sections will be directly opposite each other, each being equally accessible from the main entrance.
