WOMEN OFFICE HOLDERS

Kansas Has 74 of Them, Including One Mayor.

Kansas City, Sept. 21.—A political census of Kansas, just completed, shows women are holding elective offices in the state as follows: Forty-five county school superintendents.

Five county clerks. Five county treasurers. Six District Court clerks. Ten registers of deeds. Two Probate Judges. One Mayor.

Total, seventy four. All of these women are holding office by virtue of the votes of men alone, except the one woman mayor, who was elected by both men and women. More than 2,000 men are in the public service in Kansas, elective and otherwise. Women somewhere now hold every county office in Kansas except sheriff, coroner, county attorney and county commissioner.

They do not loaf around the corner drug store, they do not play cards during office hours, and they do not stand any nonsense from the men.—Kansas City Daily Journal.

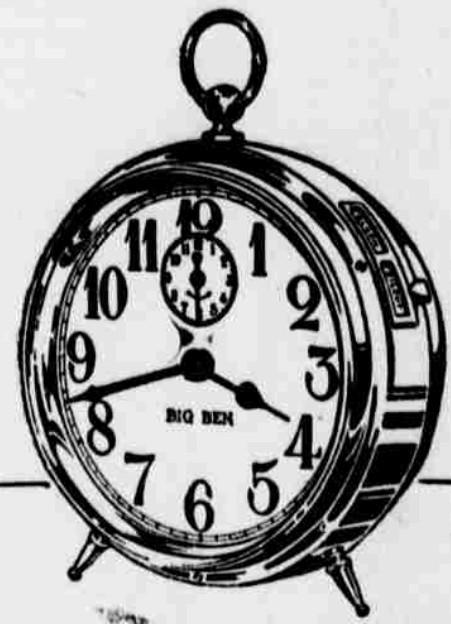
