John Christian of Red Cloud, Neb., who brought down yesterday 5 carloads of fed steers, states that a good many cattle are still back on feed there. Mr. Christian has 150 steers back which he will make pretty good before letting them go. "More cattle and hogs were fed in that vicinity this winter than at any point along the Republican valley," Mr. Christian said. "We had rain last year just about as we needed it, and for that reason fared better on corn than other sections of the country. Alfalfa is a little more plentiful and is cheaper there than at many other points, so we are in better shape to feed than others. While a good many cattle have been shipped out, there are still left many that are going to be made good before letting them go."—Kansas City Drivers' Telegram.
