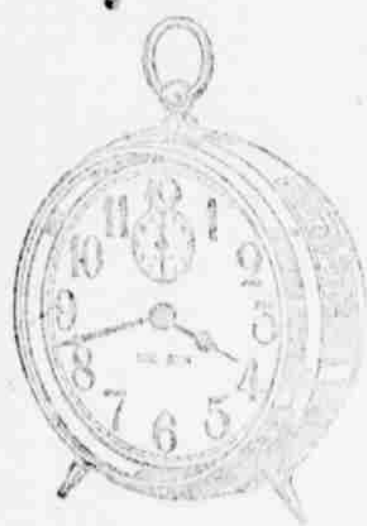

Notice to Stallion Owners

The 1911 Stallion Registration Law requires all males, pure-bred, cross-bred, grade or jack to be examined by a State Inspector.

An Inspector will be in Red Cloud at 1 p. m., on March 10th, and at the hotel in Cowley at 10:30 a. m., on March 13th, and at the hotel in Inavale at 1 p. m., on March 12th and at Guide Rock at 1 p. m., March 14, for the purpose of inspecting all stallions and jacks that have not been inspected in the vicinity of respective towns named. Horses and jacks should be brought to the nearest "hot" meeting place.

The Inspector will cost \$5 for each animal and will begin at the time of each day. Copies of the law may be had from W. R. Mohr, Secretary, Nebraska Stallion Registration Board, Lincoln, Neb.
