J. N. Echard of Inavale, Neb., who marketed a carload of shortfed steers here yesterday, is one feeder who made money. These steers were bought here by Mr. Echard last September. They cost him \$885 for the carload. He ran hogs with them while they were being fed, and he kept a close account of the feed used. His hogs, brought down at the same time with the steers, sold high, also, bringing \$7.50. The carload of steers brought \$2,085, or just \$1,200 more than they cost. "I have fed cattle before but, I believe that this was about the best feed I ever got on a cattle deal," Mr. Echard said. "The hogs helped out, and especially when they brought such a good price. Had I marketed the steers and hogs a few weeks ago I would have just about come out even. Now I am taking back home a carload of 500 lb. stock steers."—Kansas City Drivers Telegram, Mar. 23d.

"Just to keep the records straight, and to show some people that it costs money to feed cattle and hogs this year. I want to call attention to one or two things." This is the way C. W. Harvey of Webster county, Neb., brought up the subject of cattle feeding. "Last year alfalfa at this time was selling around \$7.50 per ton. This year it brings about twice that price, or about \$15 a ton. Now as alfalfa is a staple feed with us there is an item to be carefully considered. Then when we go over to corn, another staple, we discover a vast difference in that feed value. Last year it sold around 40c, now it is bringing 65c a bushel. In addition to this great difference in the feed values, we had the longest and severest winter ever known, which of course meant more feed than usual."—Kansas City Drivers Telegram, March 23d.

RED CLOUD, NEB., March 27th, 1912.
Board of County Commissioners met pursuant to adjournment. Members present Paul Storey, G. W. Hummel, L. F. Schmidt and T. J. Chaplin. G. Ohmstede Chairman of said board being absent.
On motion Paul Storey was made temporary chairman of said board.
On motion minutes of previous meeting of said board was read and approved.
Moved and seconded that W. M. Cooper be and is hereby appointed overseer of road district No. 15, Canton precinct. Motion carried.
Moved and seconded that the County Clerk write John Ohmstede of Guide Rock for pedigree as used by the County Farm Committee. Motion carried.
In the matter of the Bond of the Omaha Structural Steel works. It was moved and seconded that the bond of said company be and is hereby approved. Motion carried.
Moved and seconded that Seth F. Green be and is hereby appointed Justice of the Peace in and for Glenwood precinct of Webster County, Nebraska.
On motion Seth F. Green's official bond was approved.
In the matter of W. B. Prather's property erroneous assessment on personal property. It was moved and seconded that the County Treasurer be and is hereby authorized and instructed to strike the taxes of W. B. Prather from the tax books for the year 1911 on account of said erroneous assessment. Motion carried.
On motion the following claims on the County Poor farm were audited and allowed and the County Clerk authorized and instructed to draw warrants on said fund in payment of same. T. J. Chaplin \$20, J. A. Burden \$4.
On motion the claim of James McIntosh for labor on bridge was audited and allowed in the sum of \$125.
In the matter of the petition of U. S. L. Shirkey Guardian of the estate of Anna L. Chaffin an embezzler person, by E. U. Overman his attorney where in he states that she is the owner of certain real estate in Webster County Nebraska, and asks the County Board for their approval of the sale of said real estate.
On motion the foregoing petition was granted and an order made approving same.
In the matter of Miles Doyle's request for refund on taxes paid under protest. On motion said request was rejected. Motion carried.
On motion Board adjourned to March 29th, 1912.
March 29th. Board met all members present with G. Ohmstede in chair.
Moved and seconded that the County Board pay not to exceed \$30 per thousand and for bridge lumber and not to exceed 25 cents per foot for 8 inch piling any length from 10 to 30 feet, during the year 1912. Motion carried.

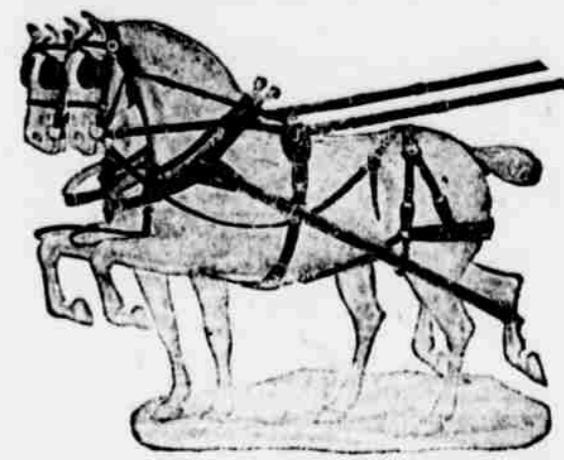
