A New Suit That Promises Interesting Questions and Sensational Interest
The brothers and sisters of Mrs. M. R. Bentley, have brought an action against the brothers and sisters of Mr. M. R. Bentley, in the district court of this county claiming half of the property belonging to the dead husband and wife in this locality. A farm of three hundred and twenty acres close to Guide Rock, and the brick block, in which the State bank is located, are involved.
The brick block is now in the name of John Bentley and a man named Forbes, the brother and brother-in-law of the dead husband. The Cooks claim this property really belongs to the estate and seek a half interest therein. The Cooks claim that Mrs. Bentley was entitled to one half interest in all this property, either as part owner, or as the heir of M. R. Bentley. Both the Bentleys died on the same day according to the petition of the plaintiffs, but it is not alleged which died first. Whether the manner of their death will be made a question in the case or not, we are not lawyer enough to determine, but the controversy will doubtless present some very interesting phases.
