Seed Corn Selection Week-Sept. 30 to

Omaha, Aug. 26th-In order to obviate poor seed corn next year, if possible, the State University and the Publicity Bureau of the Commercial Club are planning a seed corn selection week this fall. Prof. C. W. Pugeley, head of the Extension department of the State Farm will compile the necessary suggestions for the selection and proper care of seed corn, and the Bureau of Publicity will endeavor to distribute this information to the citizens of the State.

There are many reasons why seed corn should be picked out early this year," says Prof. Pugsley:

First-The crop in the state is from one to three weeks late, thus increasing the chances of the seed being damaged by early frosts and freezes.

Second-This has been a cool season Early frosts and freezes usually follow
