When the buildings now under construction on Webster street are completed our business houses will present a very pleasing appearance. Solid brick blocks with modern plate glass fronts are ample evidence of the permanency of our residence. Red Cloud has made rapid advancement since the first trading post was established here.

Crop conditions in this county never have been better at this time of the year. The first crop of alfalfa already cut is an exceptionally heavy one, the wheat is in splendid condition, the corn is all that could be expected. Wheat is practically made. Harvesting will commence in a couple of weeks then July and August will settle the corn crop. At the same time there is an abundance of garden truck of very excellent quality.

Editor Vaughan of the Guide Rock Signal is greatly bothered these days with tom cats and potato bugs. He spends all his time during the day in capturing the destructive insect that is bound to deprive him of something to eat when the snow comes, and at night he is engaged in throwing his best shoes over the back fence in a vain endeavor to silence the melodious music of one or two harmless tom cats. It is a bad combination and he has our sympathy.

If you want to see this town grow, remember that you are a part of it and that its growth depends as much on you as on your neighbors. Don't go the idea that the future prosperity of this town rests with a few, for it is the business of the many. Above all, don't criticize those who are trying to upbuild the community and do nothing yourself. They at least have the proper spirit and, just as long as you deny them your support, just that much harder their work will be.

The United States supreme court decided Monday that the two cent rate in Minnesota should stand. Nebraska people will rejoice in this victory as much as the people of Minnesota because the same conditions prevail here. Had this decision been the reverse there is little question but what the rail roads would attack our two cent fare law and the maximum rate law. The court decided in effect that the state legislature and the state railway commission did have the right to fix rates within the state and that the federal government had no authority under the interstate law to interfere with the state's business. We will continue to ride for two cents a mile here in Nebraska and "Barkis is willin'".

Wheat May Equal The 1901 Record

The following United Press dispatch to the Hastings Tribune, under date of June 10, will prove interesting reading:

A bumper wheat crop, sufficient to mill more than 16,500,000 barrels of flour, and which may reach the proportions of the record wheat harvest of 1901, if conditions from now on are exceptionally favorable, was forecasted by the department of agriculture in its June crop report. Government experts estimated this year's harvest would be 774,000,000 bushels, of which 492,000,000 will be winter wheat—a record for this crop—and 282,000,000 bushels will be spring wheat. The third largest acreage planted and favorable growing conditions account for the prospects for an abundant yield.

Concerning Alfalfa

Despite the fact that alfalfa has become one of Nebraska's staple crops, we find that time of cutting and methods of caring for the hay vary widely. If cut too early the plant is deficient in feeding value; if cut too late the stems are woody and the value thereby lessened.

Three rules as to time of cutting may be laid down: First, cut when from one-tenth to one-fourth of the total flowers are in bloom; second, cut when a new growth starts at the crowns, even if few plants have begun to blossom; third, cut when the lower leaves turn yellow and drop off. The change in color is due to a fungus disease, which spreads with great rapidity and lessens the value of the hay.

Some men plan on leaving the first crop until somewhat mature and using for horse feed. Under east Nebraska conditions, this is poor farm management as the first crop is more apt to be attacked by leafspot than later crops. We have our greatest rainfall in June, and a delay of a few days may mean a delay of a week longer than was anticipated; it is best to take good laying weather when it comes and harvest the crop even if a little lacking in maturity. The fact that the corn field and wheat harvest, followed closely by threshing, and the cutting of timothy hay compete with the second cutting of alfalfa for labor, means that if the farmer has much alfalfa, a part of it will not be cut until it is in full blossom, or later. We thus have our mature crop for the horses, without running the risk of leaf blight spoiling the first crop.
