The Union Sunday Service

The Sunday evening service in the school house park was well attended. There were many more present than could have been comfortably seated in any hall in the city. Everybody seemed to be interested and pleased with the spirit of Christian unity and fellowship exhibited. Brother Cole made the opening prayer, Brother Bayne read the lesson and Brother Tompkins preached the sermon.

He chose for his text the passage, "Choose Ye First the Kingdom of God and His Righteousness, and All These Things Shall Be Added Unto You." Without saying so, the assumption was that the visible church was the kingdom. Without giving a full synopsis of his discourse, the point that most appealed to us was the concluding one. The Christian Church was the great institution that stood for purity and the sanctity of the home life, the chastity of the maiden, the loyalty of the wife, and, in consequence, the charities of the domestic relations.

While we do not attribute the prevalent reverence for pure womanhood entirely to Christianity, there is no doubt that the teaching of the Christian church has emphasized that object. While history tells us that the Germanic races, from their first appearance were noticeable to their Roman adversaries because of the loyalty of the man to the woman, and the faithfulness of husband and wife to the obligations of marriage, there can be no doubt that the pure and sweet ethics of the gospel hallowed and ennobled the relation of the sexes into a chivalrous devotion characteristic of no other people and no other religion. Christianity touched the Teutonic family of man and woman with a divine poetry and emotion, and gave it an exaltation, a tone, a life as if from heaven.

The speaker urged upon his audience the truth, that, whatever may be the forms of the several churches, however, we may object to minor points in each or all of them, every Christian organization stood for, championed and battled for that sweet sanctity, that lovely purity in the relation of the sexes, upon which is built the family with its endearments, its aspirations, its home building, society building consequences.

He emphasized the duty of every man who desired these results to co-operate with the church, and become militant for the cause.

The Chief believes that every sermon during the summer might be devoted to this theme with advantage to the community. The Chief believes that the people of this vicinity will be glad to unite themselves in a common warfare to accomplish these ends. There are no means more effective to

secure this unity of purpose and action than these open air union services.

The speaker quit while the audience was still eagerly waiting to hear him longer, which, perhaps, is the best compliment that can be paid to a speaker, and which, unfortunately can not always be paid to sermons. Mr. Tompkins has a good voice, a fine elocution, and the art of keeping his hearers expectant.

One serious defect in the services was the lack of organization of the music. There ought to be two or three choral anthems from the united choirs and the congregation needs such leading as will secure the hearty participation of every voice. Perhaps, if the choir should take it in turn to be responsible for the stage singing, and yet insist on the other choirs aiding as much as possible, this might permit two or three well rendered anthems. If a dozen or more scattered in the audience should be charged with the duty of leading those near them, general participation might result. The Chief would like to hear five hundred voices lifted in a song service, and could readily pardon a trifling discord or a few irregularities in time.
