Memorial To Judge Adams

At the morning session of court Tuesday, after reading of the docket, the judge ordered a recess upon which a bar meeting was called, and Judge Dungan was elected chairman with Mr. Maurer as secretary. Messrs Gilham, Blackledge and McNeny were appointed a committee to draft resolutions relative to the late Judge Adams who was judge of this district for eight years preceding the present judge, and report at 4 o'clock.

At the appointed hour, the following resolutions were reported:

Whereas, On the 6th day of the present month, the Hon. Ed. L. Adams, a former judge of this court died; and whereas Judge Adams discharged the duties of his office with a dignity, intelligence and impartiality, that elevated the administration of law to the highest place in the consideration and affections of the people of this district; and whereas the lawyers and people of this county desire to express their appreciation of the character and services of Judge Adams and their gratitude therefor in some durable form: Now, therefore,
Be It Resolved, First, That in the death of Judge Adams this district has

suffered a serious diminution of its mental and moral forces;

Second, That we hereby acknowledge with gratitude the great and permanent changes for the better wrought by him in the conduct of our courts;

Third, That these resolutions, with a brief statement of his birth, service and death, be transcribed on the records of this court, and copies of these resolutions be given to the Webster county press and forwarded to his widow.

Mr. Gilham spoke of the conditions prevailing in court before the accession of Judge Adams to the bench.

Mr. McNeny talked eloquently of the judge as a lawyer, citizen and friend. "What ever was best he tried to do, what ever was noblest he tried to be. There can be no higher eulogy," Mr. Blackledge made a fine presentation of the relations between lawyers and the judge, which produce a mental intimacy, a sense of mind absorbing content, a sense of mind quickened by the contact with other minds in earnest contention, yet freed from animosity. We quote the following: "It was my good fortune to know and be associated with the deceased

as lawyer, judge and friend. I found in him an able and upright judge, a fair and courteous advocate, a loyal friend. There is that in the association of lawyers with each other and with the one who presides as judge which, I believe, makes a closer relationship than can be found in any other vocation; which strips us of all vanity and pretense and we know each other as we really are. Notwithstanding the earnestness and vigor with which we conduct our controversies, there is left that clear understanding and sense of fairness which removes any sting and crystallizes friendship as precious metal is cleansed through fire. The memory of one who could participate in these and preside over them, and with that dignity, ability and candor as our deceased friend has done, so as to generally leave even with the defeated party a sense of the justness of his own defeat, is entitled to and will always have the highest place in our affections and esteem."

Mr. Maurer spoke of the judge's sympathy as the noteworthy characteristic that appealed especially to him and said as follows:

"In my opinion the one characteristic of Judge Adams that endeared him in the heart of every person who knew him was the genuine sympathy and interest that he took in every person with whom he came in contact. Whether it be attorney, client, witness, juror, officer, or layman, it mattered not whether their station in life be high or low, no person could meet Judge Adams and help but feel that he had come in contact with a truly great man, a man of broad intellect, profound learning, rare ability, sterling integrity, who was really and truly interested in the welfare of every person with whom he came in contact."

Judge Dungan gave a brief review of the leading events in the life of his predecessor and commended warmly the character of the dead judge who had been of inestimable service to the people of this district by his services as a lawyer and judge.

We quote the following from Mr. McNeny's speech:—

"Stricken with an incurable disease in the prime and vigor of life, he was brought suddenly to the consciousness that his days were numbered. At an age where man is most fit for service he came within the shadow feared by all living things. With senses all alert, freedom to move about in the sweet air, on earth's pleasant landscape, to meet his fellows in friendly converse, to work with them with almost his wonted strength, he knew that his hour was appointed for the next day, the next week, the next month, certainly, the next year, when communion with friends—endeared by sky and land well loved, must cease. He met his fate bravely, never shirking his work, never withholding his sympathy for others, never wanting a good fellowship until the end."
