Council Meeting

The city council met Tuesday evening, in the council chamber. Present: Aids. Foe, Crans and Storey. Absent Mayor Saunders and Aid. Cowden. Moved and seconded that Aid. Foe act as president pro tem. Carried.

Now that the wheels were greased the city mechanism began to revolve and City Clerk Teel proceeded to read the minutes of previous deliberations, which were in due course of events sealed with the marks of approval of the city solons.

At this period J. A. Tomlinson licensed city electrician appeared and objected to R. D. Moritz's wiring the public school building without a license. No action was taken.

City Marshal Christie announced that he had served notice upon the parties to build their walks as ordered by the council.

The application of G. E. Hall for permit to erect a building on his lots on West 4th Avenue was allowed.

Capt Sid Florence handed in his report as city treasurer at the juncture. It was ordered by the council that City Clerk Teel and City Attorney Monday act as a committee in checking up the police judges and render due report of their actions and observations.

A small claim of \$3.27 from the Westinghouse Mfg. Co. was presented to the council and the same was ad-

judged worthy of payment and was so ordered.

It was ordered that Mrs. Fry be allowed 50 cents for hauling coal, the order to take effect from Aug. 1.
