In an increase in timber sales this year and in a decrease in receipts from timber trespass as compared with last year, national forest officers see a growing use of the forests and respect for the federal forest policy.

Friday night he surrounded seven crap shooters and brought them into the presence of his honor in less time than it takes to tell it. This form of amusement had become to take on good sized proportions but our efficient city marshal has a great loud noise like quiet, and his honor sang that old familiar tune of five and costs.

Citizens of Nebraska, as well as Iowa, South Dakota, Wyoming, Kan-

sas, Missouri and Colorado have been pouring into Omaha to attend the annual Ak-Sar-Ben festivities. The early indications were that with fair weather all record attendance would be broken. The parades are attracting unusual attention this year as well as the carnival shows. The fact that the shows have been compelled to stand a rigid inspection before opening their doors has resulted in a much higher grade of shows, which has been appreciated by visitors. The general excellence of the parades has also caused a larger attendance. That the Ak-Sar-Ben attractions are much superior in general character is the consensus of opinion.

The Booster Editions of the state, as published by the Nebraska newspapers caused much discussion among the commercial secretaries who attended their annual meeting in Omaha last week. Sixteen states were represented and the secretaries were unanimous in declaring that the booster editions as published in Nebraska was the most progressive and exhaustive publicity campaign ever attempted in any state. Many stated that they were going to attempt similar campaigns in their own states. Much good will come to Nebraska from these editions said the secretaries. But it is not every state that can wage such a campaign, for every state has not an organization like the Nebraska Press Association.

Notice of Special Bond Election.

SEWER BOND PROPOSITION.

Notice is hereby given to the electors of the city of Red Cloud, Webster county, Nebraska, pursuant to a resolution adopted by the mayor and council of said city, at a regular meeting thereof September 2nd, 1913, by which resolution the council determined upon a system of sewerage and the estimate of the cost thereof, that a special election is called and will be held in said city, at the usual voting places therein to-wit: In the first ward at the office of the city water and light superintendent and in the second ward at the Fireman's Hall, on the 14th day of October, 1913, between the hours of 8 o'clock a. m. and 7 o'clock p. m. at which the following proposition is submitted to be voted upon: "Shall the Mayor and City Council of the city of Red Cloud, Nebraska, be authorized to issue coupon bonds to be demontiated Sewer Bonds of said city of Red Cloud, Nebraska, in the amount of fifteen thousand dollars in denominations of five hundred dollars each, payable to bearer, to become due 20 years after the date thereof, but payable any time after the expiration of five years at the option of said city, and bearing not to exceed five per cent annual interest and to be dated the day of their issuance, interest and principal to be payable at the office of the state treasurer of Nebraska. Said bonds to be sold not less than par value with accrued interest and proceeds thereof to be used by said city for the construction and establishing a system of sewerage in and for said city, said system not to include any lateral or district sewer; and shall the mayor and council of said city annually levy the necessary tax upon all the taxable property within said city, in addition to all other taxes, to pay the interest upon said bonds, as the same may become due and to furnish a sinking fund for the payment of the principal of said bonds, and an annual tax of not to exceed two mills on the dollar of assessed valuation of the property of said city for the purpose of maintaining and repairing said system of sewerage." The form of the ballot to be used on said election shall be as follows:

Vote for one
For sewerage bonds and taxes.....
Against sewerage bonds and taxes.....
And to be voted and marked by making a cross in the space provided in the usual manner as provided by law.

Should a majority of the ballots cast at such an election be in favor of said proposition the mayor and council of said city will be authorized to issue and negotiate said bonds according to the conditions and for the purpose specified in the foregoing proposition and as also contemplated by the statutes of Nebraska as in such case provided and it shall be the duty of the mayor and clerk of said city when so authorized and by order of the city council to sign and attest said bonds and affix thereto the seal of said city. The proceeds of said bonds shall be paid to the treasurer of said city of Red Cloud and kept by him in a separate fund, apart from other moneys, to be known as a sewerage fund and paid out only by order of the council and warrant drawn against the same for said purpose specified and no other.
