Joseph Hidy
 One of the early settlers of Webster county, Mr. Joseph Hidy, died last week, and the funeral drew together quite a considerable assemblage of the older settlers and neighbors and others who have known and respected him in the many years gone by.
 Upon the death of his wife, which occurred a number of years ago, he went to reside with his son, Mr. William J. Hidy, at Trenton, Nebraska. He has been living there for the last six years. He has been a severe sufferer for a long time past.
 Rev. John Williams, pastor of the Christian church at Guide Rock, was in charge of the funeral, and the deceased was laid to rest beside his wife in the cemetery six miles north west of Coxiex, the service being held in the Barr School House, on Wednesday afternoon.
 Following is the obituary which was read in connection with the funeral sermon:
 Mr. Joseph Hidy was born in Lafayette county, Ohio, September 8, 1834, and died at the Stratton hospital, Stratton, Nebraska, October 6, 1913. He was therefore seventy nine years and twenty six days old at the time of his death.
 He was married to Mrs. Carns in the year 1856. They were the parents of five children, only two of whom are now living—Wm. J. Hidy, of Trenton, Nebraska and Mrs. Mary Watkins, of Mutual, Oklahoma.
 The deceased leaves one brother, two children, and eleven grandchildren, besides a host of friends, to mourn his loss.
 Mr. Hidy was a member of the Christian church, and to the best of his ability endeavored to live a true Christian life. He was loved and respected by all who knew him.

F. E. Goble
 The body of Frederick Goble was brought to this city last Wednesday for interment beside his wife, his sons Harry and Frank accompanying the corpse. Mrs. Harry Goble also was present. For many years Mr. Goble was one of the leading citizens of Red Cloud. He commenced his career in this city as the book keeper of R. D. Jones, and eventually became associated with Mr. Jones as partner. At one time he was supposed to be possessed of considerable wealth. He owned the well known Goble ranch south west of the city. Unwilling to take the chances that Mr. Jones was ambitious to take, he withdrew from the firm. But the subsequent collapse of the business left him in possession of much of Mr. Jones' paper which proved uncollectable. At the period when he should be retiring from active life, he felt compelled to seek a new opening and take up the burden of life again. He went to Oklahoma where he has made his home for the last few years.
 Mr. Goble, at one time studied, and perhaps, practiced law. He was a gentleman of much and various information, an agreeable companion, of the strictest integrity, good morals and liberal mind. He served one or more terms on the city council and was regarded as a leader among the temperance forces of the city.
 His oldest child, Maude, was the wife of V. B. Fulton, and the old gentleman took a great deal of pride in Mr. Fulton's twins. His wife died several years ago, and following her, his daughter, Maude, was laid beside her mother. The two sons, Harry and Frank and the twin children of Mr. Fulton are his only descendants.
