University To Be Represented At The International

The Stock Judging Team of the University of Nebraska started Tuesday, November 18th on an extended trip through Iowa and Illinois. During the trip the team will visit many of the best stock farms of the Central West. The team will reach Chicago in time to participate in the Annual Students' Judging Contest, which is held in connection with the International Live Stock Exposition on Saturday, November 29th. Usually there are from twelve to fifteen American and Canadian Colleges entered in this contest. Consequently the winning of first place is quite an honor. The team that represents Nebraska this year is the strongest that the University has ever turned out and a creditable showing at Chicago is assured. Professors Bliss and Gramlich of the Animal Husbandry Department accompanied the team on its trip.

Following the custom of former years the Animal Husbandry Department will send an exhibit of steers to Chicago to be entered in the fat steer classes of the International Live Stock Exposition. Twelve animals representing the Short-Horn, Angus, Hereford and Galloway Breeds will be shown. The University first exhibited steers in Chicago in 1901. Since that time approximately two hundred ribbons have been won, including one grand championship, eighty firsts and championships, and fifty second prizes. Nebraska steers in demonstrating their superiority as meat producing animals have at the same time demonstrated the ability of the Nebraska ration of home grown corn and alfalfa to produce the highest quality of beef.

Forest Notes

Eastern manufacturers are looking to the northwest for hardwoods for the manufacture of clothes-pins. Birch is particularly wanted.

The Panama canal commission has requested the forest service to inspect the timber being crosscut at Seattle and Tacoma for the commission.

The net receipts from the national forests of Washington and Oregon during the past four months amounted to \$115,620, an increase of 17 per cent over receipts for the same period last year.

Of the two million trees to be planted on the national forests of Montana and northern Idaho during the present fiscal year, one-half have been set out this fall and the rest will be put in next spring.

A thoroughly up-to-date sawmill with a capacity of 6,000 board feet a day has been erected on the south coast of Mindanao island. It is of American make throughout, and uses the modern bandsaw. This is one of the several such mills in the Philippines.

To Clean Statuary.

To clean statuary or ornaments of white parian marble put a small tablespoonful of washing soda into a pail half full of tepid water. Soap yellows marble, and should not be used. Scrub gently with a nail brush, after which rinse twice. Wipe dry with a clean towel. Be sure the ornaments are perfectly dry before they are put back in their places, for if they are not, a moist ring at the base of each may injure the table or mantel on which they stand.
