Large Attendance Predicted For Winter Course At The State Agricultural School

All indications point to an increased attendance in the winter course in the University School of Agriculture. This course is six weeks in length beginning January 6 and closing February 17th. Many men of all ages take advantage of this short course every winter to gain new knowledge along agricultural lines.

The School of Agriculture will offer lectures and demonstration work in Soils, Crops, Farm Machinery, Farm Motors, Animal and Dairy Husbandry, Animal Pathology, Farm Forestry, Entomology, Plant Physiology, Horticulture and Farm Management.

Herds of pure bred dairy cattle and beef animals will be used for demonstration in the judging classes.

Thousands of dollars worth of farm machinery and farm motors will be on exhibition for use in studying Farm Mechanics. The instructors are all specialists in their various lines and the lectures will apply directly to the Nebraska farm problems.

At the close of the winter course a special train will take the students to South Omaha where a day will be spent in visiting the stock yards and packing houses.

The only fee charged is a registration fee of \$1.00. Board and room may be secured for four to five dollars per week. The expense of the entire term may not exceed \$40.00.
