Mrs. Sarah J. Ryan, aged 67 years, died at the home of her son, James Ryan, who resides thirteen miles south west of this city, Monday morning. The funeral was held from the Catholic church Wednesday morning. Father Fitzgerald officiating. She leaves several children to mourn her death. Burial took place in the Catholic cemetery.

Miss Bessie Pegg, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Pegg died Sunday at Omaha and the body was brought here Monday evening. The funeral was held Tuesday morning at the Methodist church, Rev. Wright conducting the services. She leaves besides her parents, five brothers and three sisters and a large number of friends to mourn her death. Interment took place in the city cemetery.

Mrs. Fannie M. Brown died at the home of her mother, Mrs. Haney, last Saturday after a long illness. She was born April 3, 1869. Her husband died a few years ago. The funeral was held at the Brethren church Tuesday afternoon at 2 o'clock. Rev. Wagoner and E. W. Edson conducted the funeral services. She leaves four sons to mourn her death. Interment took place in the city cemetery.

Joseph Holtz, aged 82 years, 4 months and 16 days, died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Anthony Schaefer, who lives southwest of this city, Saturday afternoon. He was born in Hamburg, Germany, August 30, 1832. He was married to Caroline Smith September 29, 1858 and to this union were born six children. He was a member of the Lutheran church. The funeral was held Monday afternoon, Rev. Hummel conducting the services. Interment took place in the city cemetery.

Red Cloud Wants Reformatory

Nine Nebraska towns have entered the race for the location of the state reformatory soon to be settled by the board of control, says the World-Herald. The towns are Hastings, Kenney, Plattsmouth, Red Cloud, Humboldt, Table Rock, Holdrege, Crete and Louisville. The board made the announcement today that it would get busy in this direction and that it hoped to make the selection by a date not later than February 15. It is probable that exhibits, maps and briefs setting out the advantages of all towns will be examined by the board in addition to the trips to be taken to each site offered the state for the institution.

The Red Cloud Chamber of Commerce has taken up the matter with real earnestness, and the Public Improvement committee of this popular organization is soon to get busy and select a site, arrange data, etc., to be submitted to the board of control, and which will clearly demonstrate the many advantages of locating this institution at this place. Come on, get in the band wagon. Let us all pull together and land this new reformatory in Red Cloud.

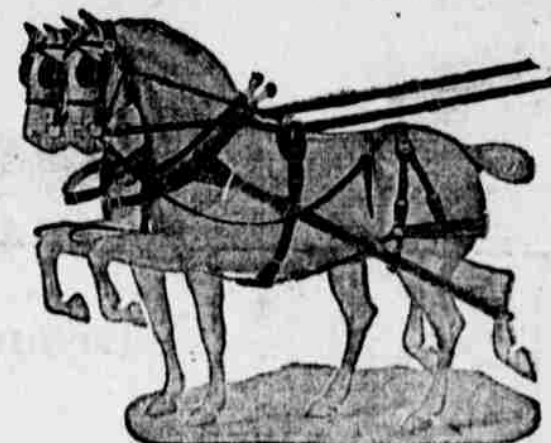
