Where To Tell Seed Woes

Specific information regarding the purity of seeds on the farm may be obtained from Miss Louise M. Allen of Lincoln, recently appointed to be head seed inspector of the state. Miss Allen is beginning her work by an inspection of all wholesale seed houses of the state. As she is a graduate of the University of Nebraska and has had charge both of the seed work of the government at the State experiment station and of seed analysis of the state of Washington, she is considered to be eminently qualified to answer definite questions regarding seed difficulties.

How To Tell Your Cow's Fortune

The way to tell your cow's fortune is to find out what she is producing, by the use of scales and the Babcock test. Then subtract her cost. That it pays to do this is graphically illustrated by the experience of the State College of Agriculture. The college had in its herd two cows named Elsie and Gold which were of the same age and breed and were receiving the same care. One could not tell by the looks of them which was the better cow. Elsie's average annual butter fat was valued at \$116.10 and her average annual cost was \$66.50, so that her income was \$49.60. Gold's average annual pounds of butter fat were valued at \$74.70 and her cost of feed was \$64.15, leaving but \$10.55 for her income.

1914 Nebraska Boys' Acre Corn Club

CONTEST RULES

1. Contestant must be a club member--age: 10 to 18 years, inclusive.
2. Each contestant shall agree to make a special study of sowing, selecting, planting, cultivating and harvesting corn.
3. Plot must be one acre, rectangular in shape. This acre may be part of a larger field which club member is caring for.
4. All work must be done by club member.
5. The acre must be measured, corn husked and then weighed in the presence of two disinterested freeholders. Affidavit must be sent to County Superintendent and State University Agricultural Extension Department.
6. Corn must be weighed as per instructions sent out by U. S. Department of Agriculture and State Department of Agricultural Extension.
7. Ten ears of the corn must be exhibited at the County Contest, and at the State Contest.
8. In counties where no County Contest is held, contestants are eligible to state prizes, but not to county prizes.
9. No contestant shall be eligible to regular county or state prizes whose reports are not complete, and who does not submit a written account entitled "How I Made My Crop of Corn."
10. In estimating profits, \$5.00 an acre shall be charged as rent of land. The work of each boy shall be estimated at 10 cents an hour, and the work of each horse at 5 cents an hour. Manure shall be charged at a rate of \$2.00 for each two horse wagon load.
11. Enrollment closes June 1st.
12. Prizes will be awarded on the following basis:--

(1) Greatest yield per acre.....	30
(2) Best showing of profit on investment.....	30
(3) Quality and ten ear exhibit.....	20
(4) Best written crop report and history entitled "How I Made My Crop of Corn".....	20
