Quite a number of our citizens are being spoken of for the office of state senator, among others Mr. Alf McCall, J. M. Steward, John L. Christian and Wm. Weesner. Anyone of these gentlemen would serve the people of this senatorial district creditably.

The new city officials took the oath of office Tuesday and are now in full charge of our city affairs. We believe that the new officers will continue the excellent work that has been done the past year and that we will have a good year. If the policies already adopted are carried out for any length of time the city will soon be on its feet. Our water and light systems are in the best condition that they have been for years.

Again the graduates of the school have sent out of town for their commencement printing. This office was asked to bid on the printing and submitted samples of programmes similar to those used in the past but a different class of work was selected. In all fairness to the printers here who pay their taxes into the school fund the committee or the school board should select the style of printing that they want and then ask for bids on that class of work. This is the only proper way to ask for bids.

There seems to be a general impression that the Chamber of Commerce is a place where gambling and drinking is continually carried on. This is a mistake since these things are absolutely prohibited by the laws of the organization. If anyone doubts this let him step into the room any time he pleases. The doors are not locked at any time and by this simple arrangement he can find out for himself. It is true that games are played there but never for money, that would spoil the whole object of the club.

President Wilson has seen fit to send the United States army into Colorado to quell the disturbances at the mines. This is a very regrettable condition of affairs. We had hoped that the President would have told these mine owners, Rockefeller and the rest of them, that unless they stopped all disturbances without delay the government would confiscate the property. More men have been killed than in the Mexican affair yet no one seems to care. We have no business fussing with foreign countries while we cannot keep peace at home.

Quite a little agitation has been stirred up this week in regard to the pool halls. A number of citizens asked the council to submit the question to the voters, agreeing to pay all the expenses of the election, but the council refused the request. So far as this editor is concerned we believe that if the pool halls were conducted in an orderly manner and in accordance with the laws there never would arise the question of having them or not having them.

Not long ago the Y. M. C. A. board found it necessary to complain of these places of amusement because they were permitting boys under eighteen not only to frequent the place, but to play. We are not opposed to pool halls, but if the proprietors run disorderly houses the council ought to shut their places up without any action of the citizens.

E. J. Overing, Jr., seems to be in greater demand as a speaker for fraternal and other gatherings than most of the professed public speakers. He delivered the address at the Odd Fellows' anniversary at Cowles Saturday, and the Chief takes pleasure in the appreciation which the address received. Independently of Mr. Overing's mental and physical qualifications satisfactorily to fill the position of orator on these occasions he adds a character which is constantly growing in those traits which distinguish the Christian gentleman. By that we mean something other than is usually meant by the mere expression of a cant phrase. We mean that, in his life, his words and acts, the true spirit of Christian helpfulness towards all men is manifesting itself more and more each day. And this spirit, without profession, without vanity itself, is illuminating his speeches, and giving to them a tone which is present only with those who are daily helping their fellows.

Some of the young, we were about to say ladies, but say, instead, misses, of this city, would be surprised to find themselves arrested and lodged in jail. This statement is in store for them unless they can learn to leave the flower gardens of others alone. They forget that in despoiling a flower garden that they are injuring others besides the owner. It would be bad enough if they were simply annoying those who by their labor and attention have cultivated the flowers. They are criminals when they do this. But their crime is more than this. The majority of the people of the city are now leaving their gardens and lawns unenclosed, not for their own convenience, but to help the general appearance of the community. The flowers that adorn the front of the

yards are for the enjoyment of all the people. Those who wantonly destroy them or pick them are depriving, not the owner alone, but all the people of pleasure. We trust heedless girls will learn to respect the rights of the rest of us, who wish to see as much beauty in our neighbors' yards as may be.
