

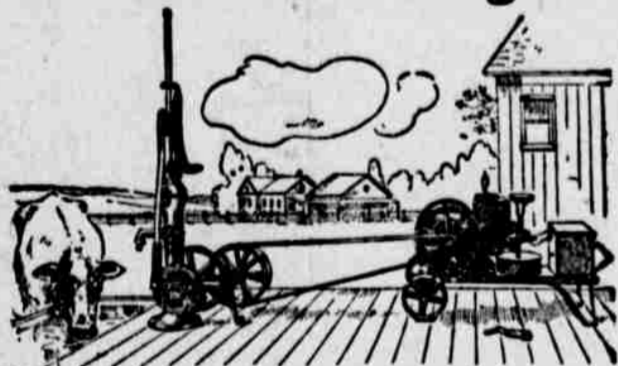

Allercyone McGregor

RECORD 2:00 1/2



ALLERCYONE MCGREGOR, No. 2550, the subject of this sketch, has a record of 2:00 1/2 on a half mile track in 1910. He is one of the stout-hearted, rugged made, game race horses, and is from a race horse family on both sides of the house, being sired by Allercyone, he by the great Allerton 201-4, his dam being the great brood mare, All McGregor, by Ben McGregor. His second dam is Mand McGregor, dam of Nat McGregor, 217-4, also the dam of Miss Deimarch, the greatest race mare that ever raced over a half mile track. Also the dam of many others with standard records. His third dam is the dam of six from 2:11 to 2:25 1/4, and with the fourth dam is a producer on his sire's side, Allercyone McGregor comes from the great Allerton family, being by Allercyone the best son of the great Allerton, who in his time held the world's dam side the first three dams were McGregor mares, which family gave us the mighty crews, who held the stallion record, 2:02 1/4, for several years, and a family that has been considered the greatest race horse family in existence. Allercyone McGregor is a fine individual and a game race horse, having started 21 times and being first or second every time but twice. He was bred by E. Kuch, Carthage, Mo. In a race at Toledo, Ohio, Sept. 14, 1910, he beat as high class a field of 212 covers as ever started over a half-mile track, the first heat being 2:09 1/4, equaling the track record made by Mattie Chiles the year before. He won the heat pulled to a jog in the stretch, and it was said by all the horsemen present that he could have paced the heat in 2:05 or better. His record is no limit to his speed, as he has been paced a half mile on a half mile track in 1:22 1/4, a quarter in 29, and an eighth in 13 1/4. While Allercyone McGregor is a power himself, he is strictly trotting bred, and what few colts he has are all trotters, and show lots of speed, and he should be as great a sire as his grandsire if given an opportunity.
