### Requires Many Mules

Adjutant General Logat has received word from the war department that 35 escort wagons have been shipped to the Iowa military department so that the Iowa National Guard will have a full equipment for actual service.

The Iowa department has 61 wagons on hand. It requires 90 to transport the equipment needed by the four regiments doing field service.

Each escort wagon requires four mules to supply this motive power. In addition to the 90 wagons, the Iowa Guard has four ambulances, so that 412 mules will be needed for the entire outfit. The government will probably go into the wholesale mule market to secure the animals.

The 35 wagons ordered sent to Iowa by the government will be from the warehouses in Indiana. As soon as received in Des Moines they will be stored at the state rifle range.—Register and Leader, Des Moines, Ia.

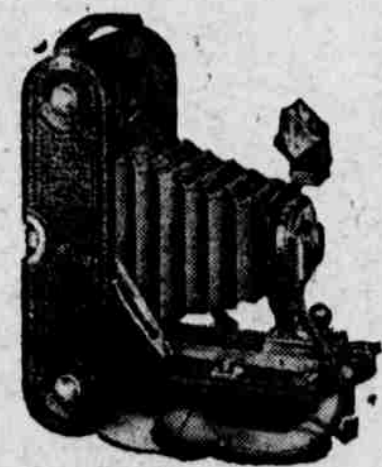
