Alfalfa vs Cottonseed Cake

The addition of cold pressed cotton seed cake to a ration for cattle of corn. corn silage, and alfalfa increased the cost of gain and lowered the profits, according to an experiment just completed by the Nebraska Agricultural Experiment Station. This year's data corroborate the evidence of the experiments of other years that alfalfa is the cheapest source of protein to combine with the corn plant in beef production. In the recent experiment there were eight lots of feeders. The rank of the rations according to profit was as follows: (1) corn, alfalfa and a light feed of silage; (2) corn and alfalfa; (3) corn, alfalfa and straw; (4) corn, alfalfa and a heavy feed of silage at the beginning, tapering off toward the close of the feeding period; (5) corn, alfalfa, and a heavy feed of silage; (6) corn, alfalfa, a medium feed of silage, FOR SALE-A nice 7-room modern and cold pressed cottonseed cake; (7) cottage.
