Board of Equalization
Red Cloud, June 9, 1914.

The County Board of Equalization met in regular session, on the 9th of June, with the members present as follows: Ohmsted, Hoffman, Storey, McCall, Chaplin and Butler.

Meeting called to order by clerk, and on motion T. J. Chaplin was chosen chairman of said board.

In the matter of the assessment of J. Chaffin's real estate in section 35 2 12 it was moved and seconded that the assessed valuation on said real estate be reduced from \$120 to \$370. Motion carried.

In the matter of the assessment of the s w 4 s 4 and e 2 s 4, lots 1 and 2, in s 4 section 25 4 10

It was moved and seconded that the assessed value of the land above described be reduced from \$2360 to \$2185, on all except lot 2, which is reduced from \$305 to \$280. Motion carried.

In the matter of the assessment the improvements on the n w 4 6 3 11, which were erroneously assessed, it was moved and seconded that said improvements be struck from the assessment on said land in the sum of \$89 assessed value. Motion carried.

In the matter of the assessment of the n w 4 5 3 11, which is assessed higher than the adjoining 1/4 quarter section. It was moved and seconded that the assessed value on said above described real estate be reduced from \$2270 to \$2190. Motion carried.

In the matter of the assessment of lots 2 and 3 and s 2 n 4 of sec 13 1-19, it was moved and seconded that the assessed value be reduced from \$1485 to \$1200. Motion carried.

On a motion board adjourned to June 10th.

Board met pursuant to adjournment with members present, except Storey. Moved and seconded that Mrs. Angelina Robbins be refunded the tax on a certain real estate mortgage, which was erroneously assessed in 1913, in the sum of \$1000, actual value. Carried.

On motion the county treasurer was authorized to refund to Mrs. Angelina Robbins the tax paid on the assessed value of \$1000 which is 1716, and was paid under protest for the year 1913.

On the assessment on lots 29 to 32, block 3, Garber's 2nd add to Red Cloud, be reduced in the sum of \$200, actual value.

In the matter of assessment of lots 12, 13, and 14, blk 31, Red Cloud; lots 3 and 4 add 10 to 12, blk 2, Garber's add, and 5 to 9 and 13 to 24, block 2, Garber's 2nd add to Red Cloud.

On motion the assessments of the improvements on lots 12, 13 and 14, in block 31, Red Cloud, was reduced in the sum of \$450, actual value; and the assessed value on lots 3 and 4 and 10 to 12, blk 2, Garber's addition, is reduced from \$225 to \$165.

In the matter of the assessment of lots 7 to 12 in block 11, Smith and Moore's add. to Red Cloud, it was moved and seconded that the assessed lots be and is hereby reduced from \$500 to \$215. Motion carried.

In the matter of the assessment of lots 6, 7, and 8 in n w 3 sec. 19-1-9. On motion the assessed value on above described land was and is reduced from \$1820 to \$1350.

On motion the assessed value of lots 19 to 20, block 7, Red Cloud, was and is hereby reduced from \$115 to \$75.

On motion the assessed value of sec. 22-1-11 was and is reduced from \$1250 to \$1130.

Pete Hanson appeared and approved the board's action in raising the assessed value of part of block 23, Smith and Moore's add. to Red Cloud from \$105 to \$195 on account of improvements.

On motion board adjourned to June 11, 1914.

June 11, 1914.—Board met pursuant to adjournment; members all present.

On motion the assessed value of part of block 33, assessed to A. M. Aultz, is reduced from 120 to \$90.

On motion the assessed value on lots 1 to 6, block 12, Inavale was and is reduced from \$55 to \$35.

On motion the assessed value of the north 14 95x117 feet of lot 1, block 1, Garber's 2nd add. to Red Cloud reduced from \$100 to \$60.

On motion the assessed value of the south 7 40 feet of lot 11 and all of lot 12, block 8, Garber's 1st add. to Red Cloud, and a strip of land immediately south and adjoining above described is reduced from \$125 to \$25.

On motion the assessed value of the e 2 n w 4 33-1-11 was reduced from \$825 to \$615.

On motion the assessed value of lots 3 and 4, block 15, Red Cloud, reduced from \$255 to \$195.

The time for filing complaints with the county board of equalization for the year 1914 having passed it is moved and seconded that the board adjourn to call of clerk. Motion carried.

June 15, 1914. Board of county commissioners met in regular session; all members present.

Harm Hoffman was appointed road overseer of district No. 4.

Joe Burr was appointed road overseer of district No. 7.

The board adjourned to meet July 9, 1914.
