FOR COPYISTS AND WRITERS Work May Be Lightened and Better

Results Obtained by Following These Simple Directions.

The quickest way to copy with per or pencil is to put a flat, heavy weight over the upper edge of the paper on which you write, to held it firm and leave both hands free. Then place the matter to be copied flat on the desk at the left, so as-to bring It as near as possible to the blank paper. With a finger of the left hand keep your place in the book or manuscript as you write, and you will find generally that you can copy quite fast in this way.

For a paper weight a heavy obling rectangular piece of brass or glass is most effective. The connecting of words by long pen strokes has very little bad effect on the legibility of the copy and certainly saves time. Of course, the stroke should be long enough to mark clearly the break between words.

Writers who have a habit of dipping pens in the mucilage and putting the mucilage brush into the ink may find premises may appear and contest the same. it a good idea to keep the mucilage bottle invariably at one side of the desk, and the inkstand at the other.

Half of a lemon set firmly in a small shallow support and renewed from time to time will be found to remove the finish from old pens quickly and thoroughly. Another good way of bringing forth the possibilities of new steel pens is to let some ink dry upon them before using.




