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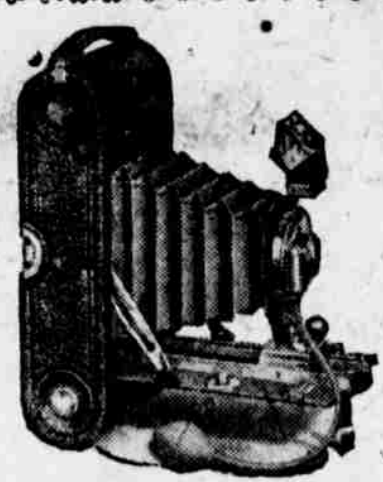

Smith, Roats, Rathjen, Day and Hedge, in reference to procuring a separate school house for the children in the north part of district, they were heard, and requested to present to the board a written application showing who wants the school, the number of children that will attend, the territory to be included, when the matter will be further considered by the board.

## Missing Opportunities

Not one farmer in nine or ten is availing himself of the bulletins of the Nebraska Experiment Station. On the regular mailing list of the station there were last year 11,000 names. The number of farm owners and tenants in Nebraska according to the statistics of the State Board of Agriculture for 1913 was 119,105. This means that only one farmer in ten gets the bulletins regularly. On the other hand a large number of bulletins are sent irregularly to Nebraskans upon application, so that the actual number of names on the mailing list is not an exact indication. Any person in Nebraska may receive regularly and absolutely free both Extension and Experiment Station bulletins from the Bulletin Department, University Farm, Lincoln.
