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#### Three Institutions at one Place

Confusion frequently arises over the distinction between the Nebraska College of Agriculture, University School of Agriculture, and the Nebraska Experiment Station, all of which are lo cated on the University Farm, Lincoln. In speaking of the state college of agriculture and the state school of agriculture at Lincoln, many regard the two as one, altho in reality they are different institutions The University School of Agriculture is an agricultural high school. It accepts students from the grades and offers them a four years' training including agricultural subjects. The school year bagins October 32, next. Students are admitted to the Nebraska College of Agriculture after they have completed have passed the prescribed entrance examinations. The college presents gate for every one-hundred votes or more advanced and comprehensive major fraction thereuf. work than the school. The degree of Bachelor of Science in Agriculture is conferred upon graduates of the college. The college year begins Sept. 16, next. The Nebraska Experiment entire delegation thus avoiding proxies Station is still another institution. as much as possible. The working staff, altho members of the college faculty, carry on experiments annually on various phases of agricultural work. Bulletins are published by the experiment station, but no classes of instruction are held.
