High School Opens With Large Enrollment

The Red Cloud High School opened Monday, September 7th, with the largest enrollment in its history. The first days enrollment exceeded 200 as compared with 185 a year ago. This would indicate that the enrollment before the close of the week will put our high school facilities to a severe test in order to accommodate the enrollment. With 76 non-resident pupils in attendance the total enrollment for the semester promises to be more than 225.

In order that the teachers may be able to handle this body of students with as little confusion as possible, class advisers have been appointed as follows: Grade 9—Ruth Johnston, Cecile Thornton and Stella Ducker; grade 10—Josephine Richards, John Boehr; grade 11—Vernon Storey; grade 12—Gertrude Blackledge.

Since last year an additional teacher, Miss Stella Ducker, has been employed on half time, and on account of the increased attendance it has been found necessary to divide the grades in two and three sections each.

The greatest handicap now experienced in our high school is the lack of laboratory facilities which impairs the work and necessitates the handling of classes in small sections and consequently requires more teaching force. Red Cloud needs a new modern high school building.

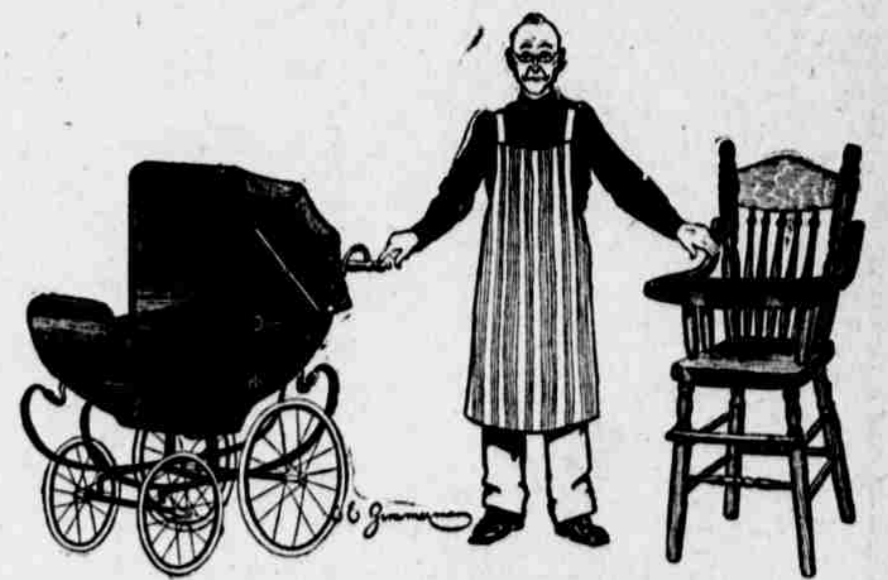
