What this city needs as much as anything else at the present time is an uptown express and telegraph office. There are hours in the day when it is impossible to send a telegram no matter how urgent the business may be. We believe that a united action of our business men would result in obtaining this service.

The merchants of this city have decided to hold another Bargain Day on the 16th of this month. This will be the biggest thing of the kind ever attempted in the city. Reasonable goods will be offered at prices that will cut to the bone. The merchants are determined to make this day a red letter day so far as price goes and the goods they offer will be such as are needed right at the present time.

We are pleased that hereafter the Business Men's dinner is to be a regular affair. It will promote harmony and good feeling among our citizens and will do much to build up the city and surrounding country. If everyone works for the common good everyone will be the gainer. At these dinners we can really become acquainted with each other and learn the common aim. This is a step in advance now for the double quick.

According to a recent count, the department of agricultural engineering of the Nebraska College of Agriculture, ranks second or perhaps first among state universities in the number of graduates in charge of agricultural engineering departments in colleges and universities. The graduates are located in North Dakota, Kansas, Texas, Indians, Colorado and other western and middle western states. The call for graduates from this department has been so strong that it has been with difficulty that the demand for graduates has been filled.

"Nebraska is particularly fortunate in her financial condition while stringency is being remarked in the east," said a prominent financial man, recently visiting Omaha. The people of Nebraska have much to be proud of. Here they are with the greatest crops in their history just when there is an abnormal demand for these food supplies. Nebraska is rapidly gaining the reputation she so richly deserves. Some time in the future, and it won't be long, our great state will be recognized at its true value. All hail Nebraska. When other states are struggling for existence, when business activity is at low ebb, here she comes with record yields. The people of the east must recognize that this state is the keystone of the great agricultural fields of the middle west.

There will always be some waste on top of the silo, says Extension Bulletin No. 21, Nebraska College of Agriculture, unless the feeding operations begin immediately after filling. The depth to which the silage spoils varies from two to twenty-four inches, depending upon the precautions taken to prevent it. Various methods of lessening waste have been advocated. Some tramp or pack the surface of the silage daily for a week or more. Another method that is sometimes used is to soak thoroughly the top layer and seed with oats. The oats germinate and form a solid covering which keeps out the air. A covering of oat chaff or cut straw may be put on top of the silage to protect it, or the ears may be removed from the last few loads of corn before cutting and the surface soaked with water. All these methods are quite satisfactory in that they keep out the air and thus lessen the waste.

There is a growing sentiment all over the country in favor of the cash system of conducting business. The reasons for this are obvious. In the first place a merchant who conducts a credit business must necessarily lose a portion of his accounts. But that is not the least loss he suffers. With book accounts running sometimes into

the thousands of dollars he is compelled to borrow money to meet his obligations. This costs him double interest for he has to pay interest on what he borrows and receives no interest on what is owing him. A merchant who conducts a cash system knows of these losses, to both himself and especially he has nothing to gain for less money. The cash system is also a better system for the purchaser. It is a fact that a cash system is a general thing. You buy more goods if they have been charged than they will if they pay cash right then and there, hence the purchaser tends to be more saving and thrifty and will have the money for all things which he really needs. His money will go farther, purchase more goods and consequently the cash system will be better for him. A system that is better for the merchant and better for the customer, should be adopted. Let there be no doubt, to get that system in operation.

Wilson and Morehead.

Those democratic editors of Nebraska, who met in South Omaha last week says the World-Bulletin, very properly recognized the fact that the democratic party has two impregnable bases on which to wage the fight for victory in November.

One of them is the administration of President Wilson. The other is the administration of Governor Morehead. Both administrations are popular for much the same reason.

They are popular because they are clean and honest and efficient. They are popular because they are constructive in their reform work rather than destructive.

Personally, too, President Wilson and Governor Morehead have traits in common that go far to explain the trust which the people have in them.

Neither is violent and vituperative.

Neither is given to exaggerated statements.

Each gives to the public a series of much work and little noise, in marked contrast to the usual political formula of much noise and little accomplishment. If both of them were to be assayed in a chemist's laboratory neither would show as much as a trace of demagogic in his makeup. They don't believe in scolding. They don't believe in arraying interest against interest and class against class. Neither will consent to attack loudly something or somebody that is unpopular merely to win fleeting popularity for himself. They believe in common counsel. They stand for prosperity and progress and development by sowing the seeds of a better understanding and by bringing together on common basis of friendliness and confidence all the diverse elements that are necessary to the unbuilding of the nation and the state.

A few years ago the country was attached to the Roosevelt brand of statesmanship. It enjoyed loud sounds and plenty of them. Now it is more favorable to the Wilson brand. It finds the still, small voice more productive of results, more valuable to the general welfare, more calculated to promote unity and good feeling.

Governor Morehead hasn't made a great deal of noise in Nebraska, but he has been well worth while. He has brought peace out of the storm. And in peace and quiet he has wrought good works. He has had much to do with putting the state in condition for an economical, business-like basis. He has cleaned up the penitentiary and made it a civilized instead of a barbarous institution. He has introduced business methods into all the operations of the chief executive office.

On May 21, the state government became official and regular. He signed an enabling law for Douglas county an election commissioner that meant for more good government and honest government in this city and state than anything has happened for many years. He has attacked evil with courage but with common sense rather than with a gun or shotgun and a megaphone.

And Nebraska has progressed under Morehead as the nation has progressed under Wilson. Progressed not merely materially but politically and socially. There is a better feeling among our citizens. There is less of hatred and rancor and wrangling. There is more neighborliness and friendliness and working together. The state is setting gentle solid foundations and is looking forward rather to substantial building than to an earthquake.

Democrats in Nebraska have good reason to take pride in the chief executive they gave the state and in the chief executive they helped give to the nation. They can enter the campaign for a vote of indorsement for both Wilson and Morehead with serenity and confidence. There is nothing they need apologize for. Their party has proved itself qualified to govern wisely, fairly, temperate and well.

If it happened you will find it in the Chief.
