### Samuel W. Foe Is Laid At Rest

Samuel Wakefield Foe, after a lingering illness of several months, passed away Friday morning, October, 2nd.

Mr. Foe came to this country from Canada, with his parents, in 1873. His first home was in the central part of the county, north of Cowles. Some time after the building of the railway into the county, he became an employee, and continued in the railway service a number of years. Eventually he removed to this city, where he reared his family.

He served as deputy sheriff under J. W. Kuechey and J. A. McArthur. He served one term as mayor of this city, and filled the office with energy and fidelity, and was alderman of the first ward at the time of his death. A leading member of the socialist party, he was a formidable candidate for the legislature on the socialist ticket.

He was an enthusiastic, zealous mason, and his character and work were held in high esteem by his masonic brethren.

Mr. Foe had the ability to win friends readily, and the friendships he made generally proved to be enduring. He was frankly outspoken in his views, yet never made enemies or aroused antagonism by their expression.

He was born near Port Hope, Ontario, Canada, April 19th, 1853, and was 61 years, 5 months and 13 days old at the time of his death.

He was the oldest of a family of nine brothers and sisters, all of whom except one, were residents of this county for some time. His brother, Thornton has been cashier of the Bank of Cowles a number of years.

He was married to Elizabeth Hiem at Louisville, Nebraska, August 14, 1880, and to this union were born five sons and one daughter. His wife and four sons are left to mourn his death. His daughter, Vance, preceded him to the grave several years ago.

The oldest of his sons, Ralph, was for many years the agent of the Burlington at this place. Everton is time keeper for the same corporation at Sheridan. Howard has been completing a course at the university, and Glenn is at present engaged in teaching school.

The funeral services were held Sunday afternoon from his home. Rev. Hummel conducting the services. The masonic brotherhood conducting his body to the grave, and performing their impressive burial ceremonies.
