Tuberculosis Day

By sermons, lectures, motion pictures, exhibits, and many other methods. The National Association for the Study and Prevention of Tuberculosis will enlist thousands of churches, schools and lodges of the country in a simultaneous educational movement against tuberculosis during the week of November 20th. The campaign is to be known as the Fifth Annual Tuberculosis Day Movement.

A special circular entitled, "What is Tuberculosis Day" has been prepared and is being widely distributed. The plan of Tuberculosis Day, as explained in the circular, does not necessarily comprehend a special sermon on tuberculosis on November 29th. If a church, school, or lodge gives the subject attention in any way during that week, this will help in the national educa-

tional movement. Outlines for lectures or sermons on tuberculosis and "stock" talks on' this subject will be furnished free to ministers and others who can use them.
