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### Mrs. Wm. Forgey

Rose Wittwer was born in Switzerland, October 13, 1860. When two years of age she moved with her parents to Atchison county, Kansas, where they lived until 1873, when they came to Smith county.

On November 24, 1881, she was married to Mr. Wm. A. Forgey. To this union were born three children, two girls who died in infancy, and one boy, John, who lived to be eight years old.

For thirty three years they lived on the old Forgey homestead in Logan township, Smith county. Mrs. Forgey died in Lebanon, October 11, 1914, age 53 years, 11 months and 23 days, leaving behind to mourn her loss, her

husband, two sisters, four brothers and a large number of other relatives and friends.

Funeral services were held at the home, Tuesday, October 13th, at 11 o'clock, conducted by Rev. Percy R. Atkins of Lebanon, and the remains interred in the Webb Hill cemetery. The Odd Fellows lodge of Salem, of which Mr. Forgey is a member, attended the funeral in a body, acting as pall bearers, assisting in the services at the grave, and in every way showing their fraternal love and sympathy for their bereaved brother.

### Red Cloud High Loses To Hastings

Friday afternoon before a fair sized crowd Hastings High School team defeated the local team by a score of 20 to 0.

The game was a hard fought one, the visitors overconfident of an easy victory, were greatly surprised to find themselves so evenly matched. The only material difference to be seen between the two teams, was the lack of coaching with the local team while Hastings has enjoyed a paid coach for several years and therein lies the tale. The game played as follows—

The first quarter opened with Hastings kicking to Red Cloud Polnicki returning ball 15 yards; Red Cloud's first down they lost the ball on a fumble. Hastings on a line smash made 3 yards on first down, second down made 2 yards and made their gain on the 4th down. Hastings on first down lost ball on fumble, Wilson recovering same. Red Cloud made 5 yards on first down, added two more on the second and made the 10 yards on the third down. On first down Blackledge lost 6 yards; and another 10 yards loss on account of forward pass. Polnicki kicked 20 yards to Hastings who returned ball 5 yards. Hastings made 5 yards on first, and Red Cloud penalized 5 yards for offside. Hastings made their 10 yards in the next 3 downs and again made one yard, on first down and on second down Johnson, Hastings' full back, scored first touch down falling to kick goal. Hastings again kicked off, Giger returning ball 15 yards. Giger made first down. Gain by Blackledge made seven yards and Polnicki made three through center. Red Cloud on first down again. Giger lost six yards on a fumble. Polnicki kicked to Hastings. Hastings returning ball 3 yards on the first down and Whitehouse, Hastings quarterback on a 25 yard run scored second touch-down Johnson kicking goal, score 13 to 0.

Red Cloud kicked off Hastings returning ball 25 yards making their gain on the third down. On first down Hastings made 9 yards and received a penalty of 15 yards for rough tactics and holding, made 2 yards on 2nd down, kicked to Red Cloud's 10 yard line, Pope getting the ball.

Red Cloud on first down made 6 yards added two on the second and made their gain on third down. Hastings receiving 5 yard penalty for offside.

Red Cloud faced to kick on 3rd down Polnicki booted ball 50 yards Hastings returning ball 20 yards, and losing ball on fumble. Red Cloud made gains on four downs. Hastings penalized 5 yards for offside. Polnicki kicking 30 yards to Hastings. Hastings returning ball 12 yards. 1st half ended score Hastings 13 to 0.

2nd half 3rd quarter Hastings kicked to Red Cloud, Blackledge returning ball twenty yards, but lost ball on downs. Hastings on 2nd down made 10 yards and on their third scrimmage fumbled, Red Cloud recovering the ball. Pope gained 12 yards on first down on an end run. Red Cloud on two downs made 11 yards. On first down Red Cloud failed to gain and were penalized 5 yards for offside.

Hastings ball on downs made their gain in three downs, which put ball on Red Cloud's 10 yard line, first down Hastings made 6 yards; second down added a yard and were held for downs on Red Cloud's 3 yard line, Red Cloud gained 5 yards and Polnicki kicked 40 yards Hastings returning ball 15 yards.

Fourth quarter Hastings made 10 yards on two line plunges which put the ball on Red Cloud's 2 yard line; two downs failed to gain and Johnson was pushed over for another touch-down, also kicking goal. Score 20 to 0.

Hastings kicked off to Red Cloud, Zeiss taking Blackledge's place, Red Cloud returned ball 10 yards. Red Cloud made downs, Zeiss making 7 yards on first down, and Pope adding
