## Commissioners' Proceedings

Red Cloud, Jan. 15, 1915  
Commissioners all present and the following business was transacted:  
All bids on Class C stationery were rejected and the county clerk was instructed to purchase these supplies at prices no higher than the bid submitted by the H. E. Grice Drug Co.

The board decided it had no right to refund tax of John Korzick on note secured by mortgage because same was paid more than thirty days before and not under protest.

The request of Harry Roats for refund of tax was referred to county auditor.

Feb. 2nd at 1:30 p. m. was set for hearing road petition of Frederick Farmer.

The petition for road commencing at the nw corner of sec 10 2-9, was rejected, no one appearing in the matter, and balance of deposit remaining after payment of costs was ordered returned to petitioner.

Forty-three window shades for court house were ordered of Ed Amack at a cost of \$63.

The district clerk was authorized to purchase a copy of Maxwell's Pleading and Practice.

The following official bonds were approved:

- Ed Herah, road overseer district 13. Wm. McCord " " 12.
- Jno. Beyke " " 43.
- Adam Alber " " 3.
- Jos. Kohmetacher, constable, Oak Creek.

The county treasurer was authorized to return \$46.03 to H. A. Roats account erroneous assessment upon filing of proper affidavit.

The treasurer was directed to strike from record personal tax of J. W. Peck \$20 assessed valuation.

Board adjourned to check the various files, chairman having appointed the committee as follows:

- County Treasurer, - Chaplin, Shidler and Hoffman.
- County Clerk, - Judge, sheriff, clerk of the district court, county superintendent, - Storey and McCall.

Board met in adjourned session, all members present.

On motion the settlement with the county clerk, sheriff, superintendent and judge, approved.

The jury came Monday morning and the criminal cases take precedence. Chas. M. Campbell v Floyd Christian et al. Court finds that there is due plaintiff from defendants \$2510. 1st lien stay of 12 months.

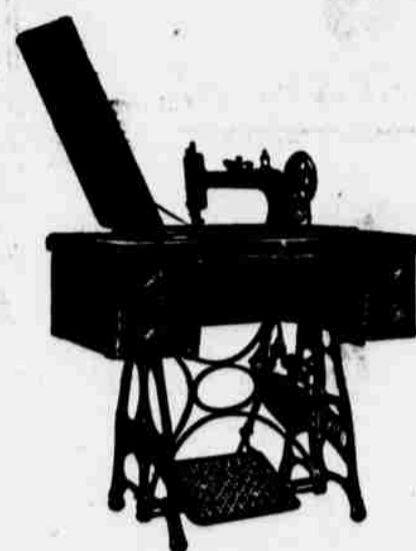
