The 1915 Potato Club Rules

1. Club members shall not be under 15 or more than 18 years of age by Jan. 1, 1915. Enrollment closes June 1, 1915.
2. Any individual in the state, irrespective of age, may be an associate member, which entitles him to all privileges of regular membership except that of competition for prizes or awards.
3. Club members shall make a special study of potatoes and potato culture. Bulletins and suggestions will be sent to members from the U. S. Department of Agriculture and the State College of Agriculture.
4. The club plot shall be at least 1/2 acre.
5. Each club member shall keep an accurate account of all items of expense, receipts, observations, and experiments connected with the club plot and shall make such seasonal reports as may be required by local, county or state leader.
6. Two copies of final crop report and story of "How I Made My Potato Crop" shall be made out and one sent to county superintendent and one to State Agricultural Extension Service not later than Nov. 1. These reports shall be exhibited with potatoes in county and state contests.
7. One peck of seed potatoes carefully selected by club member from his plot shall be exhibited at county and state contests. No member shall be eligible in the state contest who does not compete in local or county contest if such is held.
8. In estimating profit, \$1.00 shall be charged as rent for 1/2 acre, club member's time at 10c an hour, and the time of each horse at 5c an hour. Seed potatoes, spraying mixtures, and commercial fertilizers shall be charged at actual cost, price determined by local markets. Manure shall be charged at 50c per load. (Manure is worth \$2.00 per load but only 1/4 its value is returned in a single crop.)
9. Two disinterested parties not relatives of club member shall measure plot, be present when 1/2 of plot is harvested, measure yield, and sign report certifying to size of plot and yield.
10. The report shall also be signed by local club leader, teacher, or county superintendent, certifying as to its accuracy.
11. Careful record must be kept of all potatoes dug from plot before the final harvesting.
12. Awards will be made on the following basis:
 - (1) Yield per one eighth acre. 40
 - (2) Profit on investment. 30
 - (3) Exhibit of 1 peck seed potatoes. 15
 - (4) Crop report and story on "How I Made My Crop of Potatoes" 15

Pays to Roll Wheat

In view of the fact that the Nebraska experiment station has found that rolling wheat increases the yield per five bushels an acre, it is expected that farmers will practice this spring. The experiment station has found that rolling wheat after rolling was not as good as rolling alone and that rolling alone may profitably be done after the first frost.

The county agricultural agents have found but very little difference in yield where spring rains have been regular and timely enough to pack the soil and prevent churning. Where the ground is dry and the surface left checked and not timely rains have come to pack the soil, however, the usual increase in yield has followed from rolling. The agronomists caution against just rolling ground when it is wet. If the soil is dry, rolling aids in forming a surface mulch and does not compact the surface.

Alfalfa Hay and Corn For Pigs

With corn at 70 cents a bushel, alfalfa hay at \$10 a ton, and tannage at \$2.50 a hundred weight, a ration of alfalfa hay and corn proved most profitable in a recent test with fattening pigs carried on at the Nebraska Experiment Station. The pigs fed alfalfa hay and corn did not gain as rapidly as did pigs fed tannage and corn. However, in cost of gains the pigs fed corn and alfalfa made a much better showing than did the pigs on tannage rations. The test showed that it does not pay to grind corn for pigs. Pigs fed ground corn made the least and most expensive gains of any pigs in the test. Where a ground corn and alfalfa hay ration was used the cost of 100 pounds gain was nearly \$2 more than the cost of 100 pounds gain where dry shelled corn and alfalfa hay was used.
