Another Old Pioneer Is Laid At Rest

J. C. Wolfe, one of Webster county's pioneers, died at Havelock Saturday at the home of his son, S. G. Wolfe, after a short illness of three days. Mr. Wolfe had been visiting his son there since Christmas and his remains were brought to this city Monday for burial. He was born in Ohio, Jan. 7, 1833 and was 82 years, 2 months and 13 days old at the time of his demise. He moved to Indiana and in 1859 was united in marriage to Martha A. Griswold and to this union were born three daughters and seven sons. His wife preceded him to the grave several years ago. Mr. Wolfe moved to Nebraska in 1871 and in 1873 he came to Webster county and has made his home here ever since. He joined the Christian church fifty years ago and has been an active member ever since. The funeral was held at the Christian church Tuesday afternoon. Rev. Hummel preached the sermon and Rev. Beebe assisted. Interment took place in the city cemetery. Four sons—Schuyler G., of Havelock; Frank B., of Red Cloud; Fred G., of Sutton and John Wolfe of this city and one daughter, Mrs. Mattie Reed of Hastings, also sixteen grand children and two great grandchildren are left to mourn his demise.

County Commissioners Held Meeting Tuesday

RED CLOUD, March 23, 1915. Board of County Commissioners of Webster County met pursuant to adjournment. Members present—T. J. Chaplin, W. G. Hoffman, Grant Shidler, Paul Storey and Floyd McCall, Chairman of said board. Motion made and seconded that the County Attorney proceed immediately and collect from School District No. 2 the sum of \$450 for the old court house building purchased from Webster County by Secretary of School Dist. No. 2. Motion carried. In the matter of sealed bids for the construction of bridges, culverts, reinforcing rods of all sizes—filed by the following named companies, viz—Omaha Structural Steel Co. of Omaha, Nebr., Klauer Mfg Co., Dubuque, Iowa, The Millard Bridge Co., Kansas City, Mo., Platt & Freese, Red Cloud, Neb., now coming on for investigation. Said bids were opened and compared, after a careful comparison and investigation of said bids. It was moved and seconded that all bids be and are hereby rejected. Motion carried. In the matter of Road Petition of Frederick Farmer of Beaver Creek precinct. The committee appointed to investigate road in said Beaver Creek precinct reports no progress in said investigation and ask for an extension of time in which to make said investigation. On motion time was extended to next meeting of Board. The chairman of the board appointed the bridge committee of commissioner district No 5 to meet with Nuckolls county board to devise plans by which the drainage on the public road on county line between the counties of Nuckolls and Webster at the northeast quarter of section 24-19, Webster county, can be taken care of and report to the county board of Webster county the result of said meeting. On motion the following claims were audited and allowed and the clerk authorized and instructed to draw warrants on their respective funds in payment of same, viz:
