Mrs. Lauranger died in Grand Island, April 11, 1915 at the home of her sister, Mrs. George Scott. The deceased was brought to Red Cloud for interment. Funeral services were held in the Christian church April 13th, at 2 p. m. Rev. J. L. Beebe preached the sermon. L. P. Albright, C. L. Cotting, Mrs. Cora Garber, Mrs. Ruth Gellatly and Miss Edna Henderson had charge of the music. The deceased was a member of the Christian church and the Yeoman fraternity. She leaves a father, mother, four sisters, three brothers, a daughter and many friends to mourn her untimely death.
